

Sr. Dr. Mary Glowrey JMJ

A legacy of Compassion and Healing

The Servant of God Mary Glowrey had a special devotion to the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus especially in the month of June, as it was cultivated in her family. Before leaving for India at the end of 1919 she shared her inner feelings with the family:

"There is so much work to be done in India and while I stay here it remains undone since none of them are doctors they cannot really supply the needs of those women who may not be attended by a male doctor, and so many souls are lost to the Church. Leaving home will more than ever be a wrench but the whole family is consecrated to the Sacred Heart. We shall always be united in the Sacred Heart of Jesus. I know you will not grudge me to Him. Pray for me."

In the autobiography, she recalled her experience of the first day in St. Joseph's Convent, Guntur where she saw a statue of the Sacred Heart and the words on the altar, *Magister Adest et Vocat Te* which made a deep impression to her. Her name in religion was a constant reminder to her that she must always mirror the love of the Sacred Heart of Jesus and that she must cling close to the Blessed Virgin Mary after whom she was doubly named, at baptism and as a nun.

One of her greatest desires was that the Sacred Heart of Jesus be loved everywhere. The ejaculations such as "All for Thee Oh Sacred Heart of Jesus", "Sacred Heart of Jesus I place my trust in Thee" and "May the Sacred Heart of Jesus be loved everywhere" were her favourite ones.

As kindness was the special characteristic of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, so it was with her. She manifested it at all times, and in all circumstances; her great charity was rendered attractive by it. Her kindness was the outcome and example of the divine precept, "Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself" (Mt 22:40).





VOICE FROM SUPERIOR GENERAL Rooted in Hope, open to the Future

I am glad that the 11^{th} issue of *The Encounter* focuses on "Mission of Hope: The Synodal Path to Renewal," which goes very much in line with the theme of the 23^{rd} Plenary Assembly of the UISG, "Consecrated Life – a Hope that Transforms". It's a call for us to transform ourselves and help others in transformation through our consecrated life and mission, in hope.

The above-said Assembly was opened on 05 May 2025 in Rome at the Ergife Palace Hotel, with the participation of over 900 superiors general from around the world from among more than 1,900 member congregations. The event took place at a crucial moment for the Church, marked by the passing of Pope Francis and the anticipation of a new Pontiff, which makes the chosen theme even more significant. Sr. Mariola López Villanueva, RSCJ, offered a meditation on hope, understood as a "cords stretched out by God" to which we can cling. Not an abstract feeling, but a living bond that invited consecrated women to build networks of care, welcome, and beauty. It was a call to walk together, as humble pilgrims, in fidelity to the Gospel and in service to wounded humanity.

On the second day, Sister Simona Brambilla, MC, the Prefect of the Dicastery for Institutes of Consecrated Life and Societies of Apostolic Life, shared her thoughts and experience on the theme: "How does consecrated life represent transforming hope?" "Our time is like a night. But it is in the night that the moon shines." With these evocative words, she offered a profound reflection on how consecrated life can today be a sign of transforming hope in the Church and the world. The moon does not overpower or blind – Sister Simona continued – it dwells among the stars, inhabits the sky of communion, and precisely for this reason becomes an image of today's Church: it reflects a light that is not its own, just as women religious shine only when they are oriented toward the Lord. And yet, night is not only darkness. It is also a space for creativity, intuition, and birth. As on the Easter night, it is a time of labour for a new life, small, fragile, but full of hope. In a world that fears the night, consecrated life reminds us that it is precisely there that God speaks, that hope sprouts, that prophecy takes shape.

Based on the theme "Religious Women: Bearers of Hope in Demanding Situations", on the third day the morning's roundtable brought to light three realities where women religious are a concrete sign of hope. From the Colombian Amazon, Sr. Alba Teresa Cediel Castillo, MML, narrated how her congregation has walked "among rivers and forests" for over 95 years, learning from Indigenous peoples "the true meaning of hope" in the face of challenges such as fires, deforestation, and extractives. From the US-Mexico border, Sr. Lisa Buscher, RSCJ, shared the story of the Collaborative for Border Ministries, an initiative uniting nine women's congregations that served over 29,000 migrants in 2024. "Hope is not a feeling, it is an action," she stated firmly. Sr. Margaret Maung, RNDM, described the situation

in Myanmar, a country rarely free from war and political unrest, highlighting the witness of sisters who have given their lives to serve the most vulnerable, like Sr. Ann Rose Nu Tawng, who knelt before armed police pleading "to spare the children in exchange for her life."

"Religious Women, Hope in a Synodal Church" was another important theme featured by three eminent speakers including Sr. Shalini Mulackal PBVM (India), who proposed that religious life can be a "lighthouse of hope" for a synodal Church, thanks to its long tradition of communal discernment and shared governance.

I would like to conclude with the commitments of the superiors general at the plenary Assembly, which is a call for each one of us, to be:

- ➤ Women of peace, resilient, standing at the foot of the cross, daring to weep over the suffering world and to commit ourselves, sometimes to the point of a total offering of our lives.
- ➤ Women who stand at the frontiers, who refuse exclusion and discrimination and are a consoling presence to those who are rejected.
- ➤ Women who keep watch at night and, like the moon, reflect the light and let the stars shine around them.
- > Synodal women who create evangelical and inclusive communities and who weave a harmonious garment for our common home, which allows the beauty of creation to shine forth.
- ➤ Women prophets who, in old age, bearing illness or wounds, live as signs of hope, waiting and praying.

In short, we commit to nurture hope within ourselves and to pass it on, for "we place all our hope in the grace that comes to us through the revelation of Jesus Christ" (1 Pet 1:13).

An Unexpected Sign of Grace

During the final Eucharistic celebration on 8 May, an unexpected and moving moment occurred: the "white smoke" appeared, filling everyone present with joy and emotion. The Assembly began with the Holy See vacant and concluded with the announcement of the election of the new successor of Peter. A sign of grace that gave even deeper meaning to the Assembly, animating it with hope and communion with the universal Church.



The Assembly officially concluded on 9 May, with a Eucharistic celebration at the Basilica of Saint Mary Major, a particularly meaningful moment for the participants, who were able to pray for the new Pope Leo XIV and pay tribute at the tomb of Pope Francis, acknowledging his vital contribution to consecrated life and the synodal Church.

Let us walk this synodal path together joyfully, faithfully, and courageously – living our consecration for the life of the world, being **rooted in Hope** and **open to the Future**.

Embracing Synodality

A Journey Toward Empowered Leadership and Communion

Pope Francis reminds us that leadership is not about power or authority, but about service. He calls those entrusted with leadership to be servants, following Christ's example. Local superiors are invited to animate the spiritual life of their communities through love, wisdom, and humility-always pointing hearts toward Christ. Their role is not only to guide but also to inspire, encourage, and spiritually nourish. True leadership listens, walks with others and fosters environments of mercy, joy and peace.

The recently conducted general council meeting with inter-province superiors in India was a deeply transformative experience. Rooted in the theme of Synodality as a way of life, the gathering offered superiors a space to reflect on vital aspects of Church and religious life today: safeguarding, lay collaboration, personal encounter and shared discernment. These sessions were moments of grace and renewal, equipping leaders with insights and spiritual strength to animate the community more efficiently.

Synodality - A Way of Life: At the heart of the meeting was a call to live synodality, not as a single event but as a way of being. It means walking together in faith, dialogue, and mutual discernment. Superiors were encouraged to move away from individual decision-making and adopt a collaborative leadership style. This shift challenges the traditional view of authority and presents leadership as accompaniment nurturing growth, building communion, and acting with compassion.

Safeguarding - A Sacred Trust: The safeguarding sessions reminded leaders of their moral and spiritual duty to protect the dignity and safety of every person. Safeguarding is more than a policy; it is a culture of care, accountability and respect, especially for the vulnerable. For many, these discussions were a moment of conversion - a call

to deeper awareness and proactive leadership rooted in justice and love. The superiors were made aware of the importance of fostering a caring and safe environment within the community.

Lay Collaboration - A Shared Mission: A major insight from the meeting was the vital role of lay collaborators. Superiors shared stories of fruitful partnerships where laity and religious worked together in mission. This collaboration requires humility and openness, recognizing that the Holy Spirit speaks through all members of the Church. True leadership today involves shared responsibility, not control, and relies on mutual trust and collective discernment.

Personal Encounter - Seeds of Transformation:

The meeting also emphasized the power of personal encounters. Group discussions and shared stories created sacred spaces where superiors found support, healing, and renewed purpose. In listening to one another's struggles and hopes, they discovered common ground and strength in unity. These moments helped many recognize their own gifts and areas for growth.

A Renewed Vision of Leadership: Throughout the gathering, superiors were invited to reimagine leadership through the lens of synodality. This vision means leading from within the community, fostering prayerful dialogue, and mentoring with compassion. It is a Christ-like leadership – humble, relational, and deeply rooted in communion.

Conclusion:

The GC meeting with the inter province superiors' was not just an event but a call to a new way of being the Church. Superiors returned not only enriched with ideas but transformed by the Spirit. We are now ready to lead not by imposition but by inspiration; not in isolation, but in communion. In Synodality we affirm, not merely a method, it is our mission.

A Transformative Journey

The interprovince superiors' seminar on Synodal Leadership, held on 25th and 26th February 2025 at the JMJ Provincialate Guntur, was a profound moment of spiritual renewal, leadership reflection, and communal growth for me. Organized by the general council, the seminar brought together superiors from the provinces of Bangalore, Guntur, Hyderabad and Raipur, along with Sr. Mary Karickakunnel, the superior general, and members of the general council.

Synodal Leadership: A Sacred Responsibility

Sr. Mary Karickakunnel's keynote address, emphasized that leadership is not merely a role, but a sacred responsibility entrusted by God. Her words encouraged and empowered me for a vision of leadership as service, deeply rooted in compassion and attentive to the needs of the community. I began to grasp the deep, spiritual weight of this responsibility.

Embracing the Path of Synodality

The presentation by Sr. Tresa Kandlakunta on 'Synodality - A Way of Life' and the highlights on the "Conversation in the Spirit" and "Community Discernment," enabled me to cultivate a culture of listening and shared reflection - allowing for deeper insight and co-responsibility in decision-making.

All the superiors were particularly moved by the spiritual depth and practicality of these methods. Many shared that they intended to integrate these practices into their communities to foster more transparent, participatory and spiritually grounded leadership.

Collaboration and Stewardship: A Shared Mission

In her talk, Sr. Sushila Kerketta emphasized the importance of lay collaborators in the mission of

JMJ. She invited the superiors to embrace inclusive leadership that values the gifts and voices of lay partners. This collaborative model, she noted, enriches the charism of the Congregation and extends its reach into the world.

Sr. Valsa Koreth's session on financial stewardship brought clarity and challenge. She urged the leaders to manage community resources with transparency, responsibility, and Gospel-rooted ethics.

Synodal Leadership: A Transformative Journey

Participating in this seminar my understanding of leadership is changed. A strong sense of unity and shared mission marked both the days of the seminar. Rooted in prayer, dialogue, and reflection, the sessions reaffirmed my commitment to a synodal way of life - marked by listening, humility, courage and collaboration.

It was an experience of transformation and empowerment. For many of us felt it was not just an intellectual exercise but a deep spiritual encounter. The practical sessions and spiritual insights empowered me to return to my role with a renewed approach. I recognized that synodal leadership is a journey of inclusion, discernment, and faith - a leadership that listens to every voice and allows the Spirit to guide every step. With tools like "Conversation in the Spirit," a deeper appreciation for lay collaboration, and a renewed sense of mission, the superiors felt equipped to foster communities where each sister feels heard, valued and co-responsible in the mission of Christ.

As the Congregation of JMJ continues on its synodal journey, the seminar stands as a milestone - a moment of grace and growth, renewing our resolve to build a Church that listens, discerns and walks forward together in the Spirit.

From Dialogue to Discernment:

My Insights from the Inter-Province Superiors' Meet

Their leadership in nurturing a spirit of togetherness, dialogue and collaboration is truly inspiring. It was indeed a privilege and joy to be part of this enriching experience. The central theme of the seminar, "Synodality - a Way of Life" was a profound invitation to grow in active listening, engage in respectful dialogue and nurture nonjudgmental communication. For me, it was a journey of learning to tune my ears to the gentle voice of the Spirit of God, to listen deeply to one another, embracing the richness of our diverse perspectives and seeking to discern the communal decision emerging from the Spirit moving within

The thought-provoking presentation on "Synodality - A Way of Life" encouraged me to cultivate several transformative attitudes as superior to the local community:

- 1. Allocate time for sharing and understanding: Authentic dialogue requires courage, freedom and charity. It helped me to grow in deeper understanding of each member of the community.
- 2. Balance humility in listening with courage in speaking: Synodal dialogue calls me to set aside my biases and preconceived notions, creating space for true attentiveness and mutual enrichment.
- 3. Engage in dialogue that leads to growth and newness: As superior I am invited to move beyond

comfort zones and traditions, to discern new paths in the light of the Spirit.

- **4.** Let go of prejudices and stereotypes: Appreciating the uniqueness of each individual is foundational to communion.
- 5. Overcome the scourge of clericalism: Clericalism weakens the Church's mission and must be consciously addressed. I learnt to respect every one and have collective decision making through conversation in the Spirit.
- 6. Cure the virus of self-sufficiency and ideological rigidity: We are called to build bridges, not walls.
- 7. Foster hope, dream boldly and focus on the future: As leaders, we are challenged to be prophets of hope in a world often clouded by despair.




Another enriching part of the seminar was the brief yet insightful exposition on six key leadership styles. These models of leadership invited deep self-reflection and a renewed commitment to synodal living:

- **→ Servant Leadership** Placing the needs of others first, imitating Christ the Servant.
- **+ Transformative Leadership Motivating** others to embrace a shared vision with energy and conviction.
- **+ Collaborative Leadership -** Encouraging coresponsibility and active participation in decision-making.
- + Discernment-Based Leadership Anchoring decisions in prayerful listening to the Spirit.
- **Accompaniment Leadership** Walking alongside others rather than leading from above.
- **Prophetic Leadership** Reading the signs of the times, speaking truth and challenging unjust systems with courage.



This seminar has been a graced moment for me - a sacred space to pause, listen and grow. It renewed in me the desire to be rooted in the Spirit, open to the other and committed to build synodal communities where communion, participation and mission are lived joyfully.

May our conversations in the Spirit continue to inspire us to listen, learn and walk together in hope and become loving daughters of our founder Rev. Fr. Mathias Wolff.

The chosen theme, "Synodality - A Way of Life", was both timely and profoundly relevant.

Participating in this meeting created a profound impact in my life. It has given me a renewed sense of purpose and a deeper commitment to carrying out my responsibilities as a superior of my community in a truly synodal spirit. Being a young local superior, meeting the sisters from other provinces, listening to their experiences, and wisdom enriched me with valuable insights and strengthened my confidence. The coming together of leaders from across the provinces itself was a source of great joy, a meaningful opportunity for mutual understanding and fraternity. I remain grateful for this enriching experience and pray that such initiatives continue to foster unity and shared mission in our Congregation. I like to share a few points that helped me:

- 1. Deepened listening and discernment: The spirituality of synodality has cultivated in me a deeper capacity to listen to each member in the community. I've learned to be attentive to the Holy Spirit speaking through each member. Listening with the heart has allowed for more inclusive and Spirit-led decision-making. Listening to my sisters enables me to engage in dialogue, grow in understanding and cultivate humility and empathy.
- **2. Fostering a sense of co-responsibility:** I now see my role not as one who controls, but as one who accompanies and empowers others to take

responsibility for the life and mission of the community.

- **3. Embracing humility and vulnerability:** Recognizing my own vulnerability made me more approachable and more compassionate to the vulnerability of others.
- **4. Appreciate diversity:** Synodality taught me to value the beauty and richness of diversity. This attitude has promoted a culture of mutual respect and inclusion. Embracing diversity in personalities and opinions of our community, enable me to be more open, loving, caring and mission oriented.
- **5.** Anchoring decisions in prayer and the Word of God: The spiritual dimension of synodality has grounded my leadership in prayerful discernment.
- **6. Strengthening a pilgrim mentality:** Synodality views the Church as a *pilgrim people*. As a superior, I now see we are people on a journey, always growing, learning, and being transformed. This has helped me to be more patient, hopeful, and open to change.

The Synodal spirituality also enriches my role as a catechism teacher and headmistress in the school. Collaborative decision-making with laity and fellow educators creates a more inclusive and mission driven environment. Lay collaboration brings lot of insights and talents, enriching both catechesis and academic formation. By working closely with teachers and parents in a Synodal spirit, together, we empower young souls with knowledge, faith and moral integrity. This way of approach transforms my mission into a more dynamic and effective ministry of service and love.

Like Andrew, Let Me Lead One





As I look back on my first year as Province Vocation Coordinator, my heart overflows with a blend of emotions - joy, weariness, hope, frustration, fulfilment and moments of deep questioning. It's been a year of walking closely with God, yes, but also with young, searching hearts and with all the unseen realities that surround the blessed mystery of a vocation.

Often, I think of Andrew, the first disciple who, after encountering Jesus, didn't keep the joy to himself. He ran to his brother Peter and said, "We have found the Messiah." He didn't have a master plan or a theological discourse, just a heart on fire and the courage to share it. In many ways, this has been my calling too: to be like Andrew, reaching out to young people and saying, "Come and See."

There is such deep joy when I meet a young girl who expresses, with wonder in her eyes, a desire to follow Christ. Her freshness and innocent longing for something more uplifts me. In a world buzzing with endless notifications, curated realities and artificial connections, it is a powerful thing to witness someone choosing silence, prayer and this way of life. Being the province's vocation coordinator, I have made countless train rides, latenight conversations and the quiet tears are worth it. But the path, as often is not straight.

Sometimes, the obstacle is the family - anxious parents, clinging to dreams that don't include convent walls. Other times, the parents are the ones gently encouraging, while the daughter is torn between the thrilling promises of the world and the still, small voice of God. Helping someone discern isn't about faith; it's about accompaniment - slow, prayerful and often without visible results. That's hard. It takes patience, surrender, and a readiness to face rejection without letting it harden your heart.

Over the past year, I've walked through many corners of our country like Kerala, Karnataka, Andhra Pradesh, Uttar Pradesh, Jharkhand, Bihar, and Goa. Each place is its own world, full of rich culture, unique challenges and the same eternal question: What is God asking of me? Sometimes, I plant seeds and walk away wondering if anything will grow. Other times, I see a quiet 'yes' bloom into a beautiful, unexpected vocation.



Being a vocation promoter in today's technodistracted world is like sowing seeds on a digital, noisy field. But I've learned something crucialit's not about success. It's about faithfulness. Faithfulness in offering the invitation of Christ, in walking beside the uncertain and in trusting that God will bring the harvest in His time, not mine.

I am not here to fill the convents. I am here to be a Sower, a signpost, a sister and sometimes just a silent witness to God's mysterious work in someone's soul.

As I move forward, I carry with me the faces, stories, doubts and dreams I've encountered. They are written into the pages of my journey with Christ. And like Andrew, I continue to say: "Come and See." The joy is real. The struggles are many. But the One who calls is faithful and He is still calling, even in the most unexpected places.

With renewed hope, I walk on trusting that the God who once called fishermen through the whisper of a friend is still calling young hearts today, even through the static of a scrolling world.

Cross-Cultural Adaptation and Missionary Life

The one-month program held from 01 September to 31 October, 2024, at the Tamale Institute of Cross-Cultural Studies (TICCS) was a profoundly enriching experience for me. It offered a valuable insight into Ghana's historical, cultural, religious, political, and economic landscape with the broader context of culture in Ghana and other parts of the African countries. I am sincerely grateful to Sr. Sundari and the Council for granting me the opportunity to participate in this valuable initiative.

We were a group of sixteen participants from various countries and religious congregations – priests, sisters and brothers. Though we began as strangers, over the time we came to appreciate and respect each other's unique cultures and languages.



Ghana, with its rich cultural heritage and diverse traditions, provided a meaningful context for this program. For new arrivals especially missionaries, this immersion offered invaluable insights into the cultural landscape of the country and prepared us to engage more effectively in our respective missions and to avoid the cultural shock.

Each of us is shaped by our own cultural background and entering into a new cultural context often brings about cultural shock which can be both positive and negative. This is a natural part of the cross-cultural experience. However, embracing and respecting the uniqueness of each culture is essential. For missionaries, being sent

means more than just proclaiming the Word; it involves entering deeply into the lives and cultures of those they serve. Sensitivity to cultural norms, including understanding local dos and don'ts, is vital for effective ministry and authentic witness.

Developing a sense of bonding and a feeling of belonging helps bridge cultural differences and fosters unity. Adopting local customs, and identifying with the people deepens this connection and strengthens one's presence in the community.

Every country has its own traditional culture, shaped by the beliefs and practices of its people which form a vital part of a community's identity and heritage. In Ghana, traditional beliefs remain strong and are deeply rooted in the society. It is notable that even among Catholic families, elements of traditional practices continue to be observed, reflecting the enduring influence of ancestral customs alongside religious faith.

Respecting and valuing the culture is fundamental in Ghana. The **Golden Stool of the Ashanti** symbolizes authority and is a powerful emblem of the people's identity and unity. African indigenous religions (AIR) encompass a wide range of belief systems and practices, rather than a single unified religion.

The 5 parts of Religion are:

B=Beliefs

P=Practices, Ceremonies and Festivals

R=Religious objects and places

V=Values and Morals

R=Religious Officers or Leaders



As part of our orientation program, we visited some of the historical places around Tamale and beyond, such as Red Clay Park, Paga crocodile pond, Burkina Faso border etc. We had the introduction to the Dagbani language. We visited the local community of 'Gushegu' a forsaken camp of women, accused of witchcraft in Tamale. It was a painful and heart touching site. These women are often blamed for misfortunes in their families or communities and are subsequently ostracized and are pushed out from the family and village. They are forced to spend their whole life till their death in the camp.

They work as laborers on others' farms to earn a living. On market days, they sweep the grounds and collect the grains that have fallen, which they then take home to clean, carefully separating them from sand, stones, and dust, wash and dry them. Many have shared the hardships and painful realities of their lives. The SVD Fathers are actively working for their upliftment, offering support and helping them to live a dignified life.

In short, **cross-cultural spirituality** is a call to transformation. Human life is in a constant state of change and we move according to the change. Each new change in life brings us transformation, which takes place while living in another culture and learning new language. We need to adopt an incarnational approach from within instead of balcony approach. In the first place we need to listen, see, observe, and participate in the ceremonies and festivals to get incarnated thus we become one family. And this is our adaptability and availability as a missionary.

There are moments in our journey of faith that linger in the heart like the scent of incense. The presence of the leaders like Sr. Vijaya Mary Udumala, Sr. Innamma Yeruva, and Mrs. Rojamma Yasaggari, along with several priests and lay collaborators, lent grace and dignity to the occasion. But the most poignant moments came from the voices of the people she touched. Mr. Suresh from Kondramutla and Mrs. Ganga Yamarthi from Durgi offered heartfelt testimonies that brought tears to many eyes. Their words weren't rehearsed; they were born from lives changed by a sister who walked with them in their need.

A Living Flame

As I listened, I found myself silently praying: "Lord, let me love and serve with even a fraction of her zeal." Sr. Josepha's life was not loud, but it was luminous. She did not seek recognition, yet she remains unforgettable. Her leadership as the first Indian Provincial of our Congregation marked

a turning point in our history. But even more powerful was her simplicity, her deep, prayerful gaze and her unwavering care for the least of our brothers and sisters. One of our sisters whispered to me during the tribute, "She was our St. Josephstrong, silent and steadfast." I couldn't have said it better.

A Tribute to Our Founder and Missionary Legacy

The political, social, and religious conditions in the Netherlands during the 18th and 19th centuries were marked by strong Protestant dominance. The Dutch Catholic community suffered greatly under this government persecuted, denied the right to hold public office, and excluded from public life. Treated as second - or even third-class citizens, they were forced to practice their faith in secrecy, often in catacombs. Yet, in the face of such adversity, they clung steadfastly to their faith.

Amid this oppressive context, several compassionate individuals emerged to restore hope and dignity to the Catholic Church in the Netherlands. Among them, the most outstanding was our beloved Founder, Rev. Fr. Mathias Wolff, S.J. A man of deep prayer and bold vision, he lived by maxims such as "I want to work like a giant" and "I want to win souls for Christ." He saw education as the key to renewing the Church and liberating its people.


With this conviction, Fr. Wolff founded educational institutions in Amersfoort and Engelen, collaborated with the Diocese of Nijmegen and initiated vocational training and sewing classes in cities like Amsterdam, Utrecht, and 's-Hertogenbosch. Believing that a women's religious congregation was essential to this mission, he established what would become the Congregation of the Sisters of JMJ. His vision extended beyond the borders of his homeland. Inspired by his call "The Sister of JMJ should bear the four corners of the world in her heart and be ready to go wherever obedience calls her," our Dutch missionary sisters courageously left for Indonesia in 1898, India in 1904, and later to Australia and Africa. It was their generosity and unwavering missionary spirit, leaving behind the comfort of their homeland to serve in distant lands

with unfamiliar languages, climates, cultures, and food, that opened the way for many of us to discover the JMJ Congregation and find our calling within it. Their legacy is evident in many educational and healthcare institutions they established, providing access to education for poor girls and quality healthcare for people from all walks of life. Their mission lives on.

Today, Fr. Wolff's vision continues to radiate. Our sisters are ready to serve wherever needed, whether in America, Africa, Germany, Austria, Italy or Hungary, faithfully living our Congregation's Charism of an Ever-Adaptable Apostolic Availability and Ever Renewed Search for God's Will.

"In my own life, I may never have continued beyond elementary school if it weren't for the opportunity to study at St. Joseph's Boarding School in Guntur. It was there, under the gentle guidance of our Dutch missionary sisters and the inspiring leadership of Indian sisters like Sr. Ignatius Yeruva and Sr. Scholastica Singareddy, that a deeper calling began to take root in my heart. Their example of dedication, compassion and faith stirred something within me and in many others too and blossomed a desire to serve. Today, our JMJ schools across India continue to be fertile ground where countless young hearts are nurtured, inspired, and called to a life of purpose and vocation."

Wherever our sisters serve, whether in education, healthcare, social work, or pastoral ministry, they are known for their compassion and outreach to the poor and marginalized. The Spirit's breath the world can't hide.


Synodality, our sacred call,


3. Attuned to the Will of God

Empowerment Through Livelihood:

I feel deeply proud to be a follower of Jesus through the Congregation of Jesus Mary Joseph, founded by Rev. Fr. Mathias Wolff, S.J. My journey began during my time at St. Joseph's

Junior College in Kurnool, where I was deeply inspired by the dedication and selfless service of the JMJ Sisters.

After completing my basic nursing studies, I was assigned to teach at the School of Nursing. As a Nursing tutor for eight years in Jamshedpur, it remains a treasured chapter of my life. As a young sister, I was entrusted with the roles of Principal and Superior of the community. It was during this time that I truly experienced the incredible hand

of God guiding me in His mission.

I was blessed to serve alongside a senior sister in her 70s, a companion of mine, a young sister serving as the warden, and two student sisters. In addition to managing the School of Nursing and the hostel, we conducted two full weeks of HIV/AIDS awareness programs every month for all the nurses in Jharkhand State for five years. It was a time of testing my limits, discovering hidden strengths, building confidence, and learning what it means to depend completely on God.

Those days still rejuvenate my spirit. Despite the differences in age and experience, we worked together with mutual respect and shared purpose. I discussed everything openly, planned deliberately, confronted challenges courageously and carried out the responsibilities in unity and care. Often, I felt thrown into situations without knowing what to do. But everything I learned, I learned it by doing.







I served genuinely and generously, uplifted by the trust of my sisters in me. Our community was marked by openness, deep listening, and cooperation. The ego never disrupted our unity. We were few, yet the mission we accomplished was immense. We had no time for distractions; our focus and peace were rooted in our shared mission. I am grateful for all the sisters who journeyed with me for their cooperation, coordination and deep commitment. It gives me a lasting sense of shared accomplishment. This is what I experienced as the synodal solidarity with my community members.

That period of my life often reminds me of the first believers described in Acts 2:44 - 46. I strongly believe our beloved Fr. Wolff's vision lives on, not in grand gestures but in small, faithful acts of community, in the courage to listen and the humility to change. We heal not in isolation, but in togetherness.

Carrying the Light of Christ in Challenging Lands

Our missionary journey in the small village of Chapra, located in the Bethia, Diocese of Bihar, has been a profound and life-changing experience. This region is marked by immense hardship, deep rooted poverty, and education remains a distant dream for many. Human life, especially that of women and children, is often at grave risk. The realities here are harsh: brutal incidents are common, and safety, particularly for young girls, is a constant concern. Female students beyond the sixth grade are few, as many families, driven by poverty and societal pressures, either transfer their daughters to government schools or withdraw them from education altogether.

Violence casts a shadow over daily life. In many households, keeping weapons such as swords is seen as a necessity, and acts of aggression can erupt even over, the smallest disputes. Women, despite the burdens they carry, the societal constraints they face, show remarkable resilience. Mothers with young children often move about with their faces and bodies completely covered, preserving their dignity in a place where vulnerabilities are many.

Finding female staff members for our mission remains a significant challenge, with only one or



two courageous women stepping forward to serve under such difficult circumstances.


Recognizing the immense needs of the local communities, we organized a charity event through our school. We invited staff members, parents, and students to contribute clothing and food supplies for the most deprived families. Their generous response was truly heartening. The collected items were carefully sorted and distributed among two of the poorest neighborhoods in the area.



This initiative was not just about providing material support; it was a moment of solidarity, a chance to stand with those who face unimaginable hardships every day. It was a moment of shared humanity, a way to bridge the gap between those who have and those who struggle. Through small acts of kindness, we live the Gospel in action.

Each encounter with the families, each smile, and each expression of gratitude reaffirmed our commitment to continue this mission. We experienced, in a deeply personal way, the words of Pope Francis: "Mission is a passion for Jesus and at the same time a passion for His people." Strengthened by these experiences, we move forward, determined to be faithful missionaries of God's love, bringing light where there is darkness and hope where there is despair.

A Journey of Faith, Compassion and Mission





In the heart of rural India, nestled amid the forests and fields, lives a community often overlooked the Santhals, one of the largest tribal groups in the country. Historically marginalized and excluded from mainstream education, many Santhal children grow up believing the world beyond their villages is not for them. I saw this harsh reality - and decided to do something.

My journey in Giridih in the state of Jharkhand, began not with grand plans, but with a simple desire: to make a difference. When I first came to Giridih a very remote Santhal area. I met many students who lack opportunities for better education. I knew I couldn't change their lives overnight. But I could be a bridge - a bridge between their silent dreams and the world beyond. The first step was not teaching, but listening. Education, I explained, was not just about books - it was a tool to preserve their identity and unlock their future.

We began with four small rooms. And every day, we worked on more than literacy - we worked on confidence, dreams, and discipline. Their transformation is not just academic -it's spiritual, emotional, and cultural.

The road has not been easy. We battled dropouts, poverty, language barriers, and deep-rooted societal neglect. But for every student who chose Nursing education over early marriage, for every parent who allowed a daughter to study, for every smile after a passed exam - it was worth it.

To see a Santhal student stand on stage, speak in English, and dream fearlessly - that is my reward. From nothing to something, from shadows to spotlight - this is the power of belief, of education, and of an unyielding mission.

Training Santhal students for nursing is not just about professional education - it's about rewriting destinies. It's about giving young tribal youth the tools to heal others and to rise themselves. In their hands lies not just care, but hope. And in their eyes, the light of a future once thought impossible.



Today when I look back my mission over here I feel so happy and contented. I thank God Almighty for making use of my talents for these students because I started just with 19 students and now just two years completed and we have more than 156 students getting trained. I am glad that these young students are breaking barriers and stepping into the noble field of nursing. This is the story of transformation. Of training Santhal students not just for jobs, but for life. Not just for income, but for impact.

As I reflect on my journey as a religious and as a nursing tutor, I see a beautiful thread running through every classroom session, every hospital visits at patient's bedside and every whispered prayer at dawn, a thread of compassion, service, and faith guiding my mission.

The spirituality and charism of JMJ empowers me in three profound ways:

1. Formation through Compassion

As a tutor, I am not just forming professionals; I am shaping the future of my country. The JMJ charism helps me to mentor students with love

and discipline, teaching them to see their work as a ministry and not just a career.

2. Healing through Presence

The healing ministry is not just about medicineit is about being present, just as Mary stood at the foot of the Cross. I have learned from her silent strength and Joseph's faithful support that presence is healing in itself.

3. Mission through Community

In JMJ we are never alone. We live in sisterhood and communion and that spirit spills into my mission reminding me to collaborate, to listen and to serve joyfully, whether in teams or in solitude.

A Charism Lived in Communion

The Church today calls us to a path of synodality - journeying together in faith, mission and dialogue. And for me, this aligns deeply with the JMJ charism. The Holy Family walked together, they listened to each other, they responded to God's voice in community. So, for me synodality in my daily work means:

- Listening to the students not just as learners but as future caregivers with their own stories and passion.
- Collaborating with healthcare teams in mutual respect.

Being open to the Spirit moving through others' insights not just my own.



Arco Mission -A Divine Providence

Arco, deriving its name from the Latin word Arx meaning "fortress", developed around a hilltop castle, gradually expanding into the town it is today. True to its name, the town grew around a castle that once stood proudly on a hilltop. In the past, its mild climate led to the founding of several sanatoriums. Over the past 60 years, Arco has grown into a dynamic center of industry, agriculture, and tourism. Key landmarks include the Castello di Arco and the Collegiata dell'Assunta, a baroque church built between 1613 and 1671 by Giovanni Maria Filippi. The local economy thrives on summer tourism and the production of olive oil, wine, and fruit. Arco's cultural heritage is celebrated through traditional crafts and the feast of its patron saint, Saint Anne, on June 26th.

The JMJ Congregation's presence in Arco is a testament to God's surprising and providential plan. On 02 September 2024, Sisters Usha Chacko, Sarojini Kiro, and Sunitha Tirkey were missioned to Arco, accompanied by Sisters Valsa and Christy. We departed by train in the morning and arrived at Rovereto Station at 12:45 p.m. From there, a



vehicle arranged by the Arco Foundation brought us safely to our new home - Mary Glowrey Convent, earlier known as Villa Tabor, a House of Prayer, for the people of Arco.

We were warmly received by Mr. Paulo, President of the Foundation, Mrs. Laura Pollini, Director of the Foundation, Fr. Francesco, the Parish Priest and members of Caritas, namely Mr. Romano and Mrs. Maria Pia, along with many others. The Arco community rejoiced at the arrival of the religious sisters, who had come to serve the people of Arco.



By 09 September 2024 all our documents were finalized and the sisters began their mission at the Old Age Home, known as "Fondazione Comunità di Arco" providing assistance and care to the senior citizens of Arco and its surrounding areas. Entering a completely new system and collaborating with lay people and staff from diverse countries and backgrounds presented significant challenges to us. Adapting and integrating into this unfamiliar environment was not easy. Everything was new—the place, the people, the culture, and the responsibilities. Yet, with faith and determination, we embraced this mission as a new beginning,

trusting in God' providence, each day as we took one step at a time in serving the elderly of Arco. JMJ is the only religious congregation working among the laity in Arco. At times, our presence is met with indifference or misunderstanding. Yet, through our gentle presence, our genuine smiles, and compassionate service, we strive to inspire and bear witness to Christ's love.

A Joyful Visit and Blessed Recognition

On 03 January 2025, Rev. Sr. Mary Karickakunnel, our superior general and her Council visited Arco. The purpose of their visit was to participate in the official presentation of JMJ sisters to the parish of Arco by Archbishop Lauro Tisi, of Trento. 06 January 2025 will remain a memorable and historic day for us, the JMJ sisters as it was a day specially set apart to introduce us formally to the parish community. His Grace Archbishop Lauro Tisi graced the occasion, specifically to welcome us and present us to the people of Arco.

The celebration was marked with a solemn Sunday Holy Mass in the church over crowded with the presence of the Mayor of Arco, President of the Foundation, many faithful parishioners, and other dignitaries. During the ceremony, Archbishop Tisi introduced the JMJ Sisters to the parish, while the parish priest Don Francesco officially read the letter of appointment signed by the archbishop, formally declaring that the three JMJ sisters now belong to the parish.

During his homily, the archbishop expressed his heartfelt gratitude to Rev. Sr. Mary and Council for sending three sisters to serve in the parish and to assist in the care of the sick and elderly at the *Fondazione Comunità di Arco*. He spoke warmly of our presence, calling JMJ sisters a blessing to the community of Arco, especially at a time when the practice of faith is declining. He prayed that our presence would bring a ray of hope, renewal of faith and drawing people closer to Christ and the Church. His final words deeply touched our hearts:



"These sisters have left their homeland and have come here to offer a helping hand in caring for suffering humanity. It is not easy to live amidst cultural differences. Yet, for the **love of Christ**, and to follow Him more closely in His mercy and compassion, they have embraced this challenging way of life. Let us support them with our prayers and welcome them with great joy. I wish and pray that they may have a permanent stay among us."

After the Holy Mass, the parish council had arranged snacks and beverages for everyone in honour of the sisters' presence. His Grace, Archbishop Lauro Tisi, along with other dignitaries, visited our community, and together we shared an agape meal. It was a wonderful experience, marked by the warm and heartfelt welcome extended to the sisters by the people of Arco. It was truly surprising and touching to discover that almost everyone in Arco was aware that the JMJ Sisters had arrived.

This is how with the prayerful support of many generous hearts, both near and far our mission in Arco officially began. We extend our heartfelt gratitude to our previous general team Rev. Sr. Innamma and council, who initiated the mission in Arco, to Rev. Sr. Mary and her Council for their constant encouragement, support, and prayers. We continue to carry out the mission entrusted to us by our Congregation. It is a journey filled with grace, but not without trials. We walk forward, inspired by the words of Dr. Sr. Mary Glowrey: "The hand that gives is the hand that blesses." With this in our hearts, we continue to serve, love, and be a beacon of Christ's light in Arco.

Empowering the Youth:

A Transformative Workshop in Raipur

The International Mission and JPIC Commission (IMJC), in collaboration with the Provincial Council of Raipur, organized a two-day workshop on January 28-29, 2025, at JMJ Provincialate Raipur. The workshop was held under the theme: "Empowering Youth to Discover, Develop and Lead."



It aimed at equipping sisters from four provinces to initiate and enhance youth ministry at the interprovince level, and to empower the youth animators with skills and knowledge to lead and inspire the young people on their faith journey. Total 30 sisters from four provinces and a few youths from St. Mary's Church Raipur were part of it. The program sought to address the spiritual, emotional, socio-cultural needs of young people while equipping them for leadership roles in the Church and the world. Fr. Dr. Yeruva Joji Reddy SDB, a renowned expert in youth engagement and leadership development was the resource person for the workshop. Fr. Joji Reddy emphasized the importance of understanding the challenges young people face today and encouraged the animators to be empathetic, innovative and proactive in their approach to youth ministry.

Fr. Joji encouraged the participants to start youth ministry in their own educational institutions, focusing on integral formation of the heart, head and hands through proper accompaniment and follow-up. He emphasized the need to establish networks among educators to share experiences, develop dedicated leaders and engage unorganized youth in their neighborhoods. Key areas of focus for youth ministry included providing guidance on career development, personal issues and personality growth. The program concluded with participants reflecting on the powerful mantra that 'youth are the heart of the Church.'





The seminar not only empowered youth animators but also reaffirmed the importance of standing by the youth, working for their cause and ensuring their holistic development. It provided clarity on the mission ahead and gave participants the necessary guidelines to begin their work with enthusiasm and vision. We express our heartfelt gratitude to Sr. Mary Karickakunnel, the superior general, and her Council, as well as to Sr. Marykutty and her Council, for their timely support and invaluable contribution to the success of this workshop.

Peace, Happiness and Personality Development through Education

A Training Program for School Students

In the context of growing violence in the society, it is an urgent need to inculcate values of peace, religious harmony, and Ahimsa (non-violence) in the midst of children at the early age. As part of JPIC initiatives for peace this program was implemented in few of our schools in Guntur province.

- 1. Amali English Medium School, Vijayawada,
- 2. St. Joseph's High School, Pedda Kakani
- 3. JMJ English Medium High School, Nambur

The program was conducted by Fr. Dr. Scaria Kalloor, OFM Cap., and Fr. Ditto Sebastian, OFM Cap. They engaged the students for four hours in each school through an activity-based, child-centered approach. The sessions focused on cultivating positive attitudes among children, while promoting the integration of peace and happiness with education under the guiding theme: "Together Towards Harmonious Peace."

The event featured peace prayers from various religious traditions, along with a transformative meditation session led by Fr. Ditto Sebastian. The students actively participated in the meditation and later shared their personal reflections and inner experiences. As part of the program, they were also taught to greet others by saying "Peace to you" while offering a handshake. This simple yet meaningful gesture helped foster stronger bonds and a spirit of mutual respect and harmony among the students.



They were given awareness on cyber-crimes, right use of mobile phones and to build good relationship with the family, and were divided into different groups to discuss on how they would promote peace in their school, homes and in the society at large. They came out with very concrete action plans, and had a joyful learning in the workshop.

The students spent time in silent prayer and were introduced to peace prayers from various religions, which fostered a strong sense of community feeling and inner peace. The serene atmosphere in the campus further supported them in reflecting on their goals with clarity and focus. Through these experiences, they gained a deeper understanding of the value of peace and were inspired to become active promoters of peace in the society.

Along with students, the teachers also participated in the training program, which enhanced their skills and effectiveness in fostering a peace-oriented learning environment. By introducing peace education and peace clubs into the educational system, young minds are equipped with the tools to become compassionate, open-minded, and socially sensitive individuals. This initiative empowers students to grow into responsible global citizens, capable of addressing the complex social, political, and religious challenges of our times.

This peace education program fosters a peaceful and nurturing campus environment, encouraging students to actively contribute to a more harmonious world. Its ultimate aim is to form individuals of strong character and integrity; good human beings grounded in core human values. Such transformation is only possible when values-based education becomes an integral part of a young person's development.



Safeguarding initiatives

Called to Care, Committed to Protect

The first half of 2025 has been a season of meaningful milestones and growing commitment to our safeguarding mission. Through workshops, policy dissemination, inter-province seminars, and vibrant community participation, we continue building a culture of protection across our provinces and regions.



It gives us immense joy to announce that following important events are materialized during the half year:

- The JMJ Safeguarding Policy was officially released on 2nd February 2025, during the inauguration of Divyodaya: JMJ Spirituality and Mission Centre in Hyderabad. The Safeguarding Policy booklet and logo were unveiled by our Superior General, Sr. Mary Karickakunnel. Following the launch, 600 copies of the Congregational Safeguarding Policy were printed and distributed across provinces and region, including our communities in the USA and Germany.
- ➤ The safeguarding commission members of Guntur, Bangalore, Hyderabad, Raipur and Ghana Region, about 30 members, participated in online training program offered by Institute for Formators (IFF), Bangalore in collaboration with Institute of Anthropology (IADC), Pontifical Gregorian University.

- A seminar for all the HODs of Guntur province was conducted on the Theme: "Safeguarding with Compassion" which dealt on abuse types, reporting, and the role of safeguarding coordinators.
- During General Council's orientation in India, sessions focused on the responsibilities of superiors in the local units to create safe environment and deal with allegations, were held in Raipur, Hyderabad, Guntur, and Bangalore. All the superiors of Indian provinces attended the workshop.
- The sessions focused on the theological and scriptural foundations of Safeguarding, healthy relationships, grooming indicators, presentation of the safeguarding policy and integrating safeguarding into daily ministry was conducted **for the TPS** in Hyderabad, Guntur, and Bangalore.
- Interactive two-day session with prayer, group activities, and personal sharing were conducted for the **pre-novices in Goa**. The workshop focused on introduction to safeguarding, recognising signs and indicators of abuse, red flags of perpetrators and introduction to safeguarding policy. Participants expressed deep learning and commitment.
- At St. Mary's CBSE School, Timarni (MP), children and staff were trained on online safety, reporting abuse, and creating safe environments. Children came forward with concerns an encouraging sign of awareness.
- Regular Congregational Safeguarding Commission (CSC) meetings were held

online to finalize schedules, assign roles, and prepare action plans for various formation levels and provinces.

- ➤ "Synodality: A Way of Life" was the focus
 of a vibrant inter-province seminar for
 Safeguarding and JPIC members on 22nd
 and 23rd February. Dance, drama, and
 theological reflection created a heartfelt call
 to protect the dignity of all, especially the
 most vulnerable.
- In the **spirit of collaboration**, and with the support of provincial councils, the congregational and province/regional safeguarding commission members, psychologists like Dr. Suman, and collaboration with theologians like Fr. Alla Stanislaus, the Safeguarding Commission continues to offer training rooted in theology, pastoral care, and practical wisdom.



Commission in Action - Oath Taking Ceremonies

Guntur Province: An online session was conducted by Srs. Joseph Mary, the Congregational Safeguarding Coordinator and Sr. Saritha, the Province Safeguarding Coordinator for all the teachers and staff of the Educational Institutions and the commission members pronounced their commitment in the presence of the provincial council and all the participants of the seminar.

Hyderabad Province: Sr. Joseph Mary presented the significance of oath taking and read Pope Francis's message. The Province Commission members took the Oath of Commitment online in

the presence of all the sisters of the province and the Provincial Council.

Ghana Region: Included an online workshop by Fr. Francis, an alumnus of IADC, Gregorian University followed by oath taking by commission members.

Charting the Path Forward

- Sessions are planned for TPS, formees, and institutional staff.
- > Standardized training materials and provincespecific action plans are in development.
- Continuous engagement with UISG and other global safeguarding efforts ensures we remain informed and united with the universal Church in our mission.

From Culemborg to Rome:

A Pilgrimage of Heart, Heritage, and Hope

The Jubilee Year pilgrimage of the Sisters of JMJ to Europe, held from May 7-20, 2025, was a sacred and transformative journey through the spiritual and historical roots of the Congregation across the Netherlands, France, and Italy. Our sisters from Ghana, India and Italy numbering 55 of us reached the Nederlands on 7th evening.

Netherlands: Retracing the Spiritual Roots of JMJ

The pilgrimage began in Culemborg, on 8th morning, where Rev. Fr. Mathias Wolff SJ with his co-Jesuit, Fr. De Hasque commenced his mission in 1816. Culemborg is also called "The Gateway to the Betuwe" for its well-preserved ancient town set in a beautiful natural landscape. We were welcomed warmly by Auxiliary Bishop Ted and local leaders. Mr. Anthony Zielhost, the president of the Church Council, who had earlier received his catechism from our sisters in Culemborg accompanied us. Our joy doubled when Sr. Anitha and Sr. Lilly, came all the way from Leuven, Belgium to guide us through JMJ's historical spots. Mr. Anthony explained every corner of the town where our Founder once walked and lived. We visited significant sites, including Pater Wolff pad, then continued to walk in Mariakroon where the JMJ sisters once ran a kindergarten and a kind of orphanage which was located behind the R.K. Barbaraziekehuis, near the city canal, and was named after the former monastery Mariakroon. During our visit to the church in Culemborg, we were drawn to the special painting of Seat of Grace (1628) by Cousiers, a pupil of the renowned Flemish artist Rubens. This treasured artwork holds deep significance for the parish as well to us JMJ. We also visited the town hall, where Fr. Wolff once defended the Catholic faith against Protestant opposition, marking a pivotal moment in his life.

Later, at the monastery garden in Mariakroon, we paid our respects at the memorial monument where Fr. Wolff's relics were interred. At 11:00 a.m we gathered for the Holy Mass. Pilgrims entered in procession, carrying a Jubilee candle blessed by Bishop Ted and six flower pots symbolizing the four provinces, the Ghana region, and the mission - honoring the Jubilee year and our gratitude to the Founder and pioneers. The liturgy set a reverent tone for a meaningful and grace-filled celebration.

After the Mass, we proceeded to St. Agatha (Kloosterlaan), which houses the archives of the Society of JMJ. There, we were left in awe by the writings of our Founder and the beautifully preserved documentation of our sisters - their handwritten notes, artistic work, and records left an indelible impression on our hearts and minds.

Our final pilgrim step of the day was Nijmegen, where our founder served as a parish priest from 1834 to 1846. As one of the oldest cities in the Netherlands with deep Christian roots, Nijmegen is also the birthplace of Saint Peter Canisius. We walked in the footsteps of our founder, cherishing each moment with deep spiritual joy. In the same church, we visited the Chapel of Our Lady of Nijmegen, also known as the Mother of Mankind, who is remembered for healing a crippled boy and according to history, miraculously healing our dear founder as well.

A meaningful prayer service was led by Sr. Lilly and Sr. Anitha, enriched with a historical note that brought us back to our early learnings from the books of the Society. We then continued to 'De Schommel' the swing - now a war memorial for

those who lost their lives during the Second World War, including 8 of our JMJ sisters, 24 school children, and many others. Our pilgrimage concluded with a symbolic walk along the path our founder once took to the River Waal, from where he visited the sisters in Amersfoort and Engelen by boat.

The first day of our pilgrimage was a profound immersion into the lines of history, especially into the spirituality of our Founder. From the religious diversity of Culemborg to the monastic peace of St. Agatha, and the urban spirituality of Nijmegen, the journey offered a rich and comprehensive experience of religious heritage of the Netherlands.

Memories of Journeying into the Glorious Past:

On Friday, 9 May 2025, our sisters embarked on a meaningful pilgrimage to Heeswijk, Marienburg, and 's-Hertogenbosch, sites of deep historical and spiritual significance to the heritage and mission of our Congregation.

We arrived at Hoofdstraat 80, Heeswijk-Dinther, Mariakroon Garden the sacred resting place of our beloved founder, Rev. Fr. Mathias Wolff and JMJ Sisters. The site serene and exudes a quiet beauty, welcomed the sisters into a moment of stillness, prayer and deep reflection. A solemn prayer service was held at the gravesite. In a spirit of reverence, our hearts lifted in prayer and thanksgiving. In that quiet, sacred space, time felt suspended, and all were enveloped in a profound spiritual connection with our founder and the generations who walked before us in faith.

Then we visited to the Dutch Sisters' Home – Abdijstraat. It was a Grace-Filled encounter with Our Dutch Sisters. We arrived at Cunera De Bongard, a serene and welcoming haven where 21 of our beloved Dutch Sisters now live out their sunset years in peace, companionship and spiritual tranquillity. The home exuded a quiet dignity, reflecting the lives of the sisters who dwell there, pillars of our Congregation's enduring legacy, fostering intergenerational connection and gratitude.

We were graciously received by Sr. Laetitia, the Regional Superior. In her touching address, she reflected, "My life is like a Psalm, an unfolding hymn of gratitude, trust, and praise to God." The visit unfolded into a heartwarming time of joyful interaction, shared memories, and mutual appreciation. The room echoed with laughter and heartfelt conversations, which reminded us of the missionary zeal, silent sacrifices, and unwavering commitment of our senior Dutch Sisters, whose pioneering spirit helped lay the foundation of our Congregation.

Symbol of Unity: Jubilee Year Badges as a gesture of togetherness and love, were presented to the sisters with the Jubilee Year logo, symbolizing our unity as one family in mission across generations and geographies. The visit was more than an event, it was a chapter of love, legacy, and spiritual kinship, one that will remain etched in our hearts forever.

After lunch, we visited Marienburg, a place of mission and legacy from where our pioneering Sisters were first sent forth to India and Indonesia. We arrived at JADS University, stepping into a place that once echoed with prayer, service, and dedication. Though now an academic hub, the spirit of the JMJ legacy still lingers in its walls. We were warmly welcomed by the staff of JDAS University.

As we moved through the ancient corridors and rooms, we felt the presence of those who had gone before us. The sacred walls stood as silent witnesses, holding in their quiet embrace the prayers, sacrifices, and dreams of our sisters who once lived and breathed life into this mission. Every stone, every shadow seemed to whisper stories of courage and calling. This was not just a place, it was a sacred ground, etched with our shared past and soaked in purpose. In a meaningful prayer service, we paused to recall, reflect, and reawaken the legacy left in our care. With hearts full of pride, we walked through this cherished space, capturing memories, especially in the serene

Pear Garden, a special attraction that added beauty to our visit.

Our next visit was to the magnificent St. John's Cathedral at Den Bosch, a spiritual and architectural marvel with faith expressed in stone, glass, and silence. As we stepped into this awe-inspiring sanctuary, we were drawn into a deeper awareness of God's presence. Praying the Rosary at the feet of Our Lady united us spiritually with generations of pilgrims who have sought her intercession with trust and devotion. The serene explanations by Bro. Rangel, a member of the Franciscan order, opened our hearts to the theological richness embedded in the cathedral's sacred art.

Blossoms of Grace:

Our destination on 10th May was the renowned Keukenhof Garden, affectionately called the "Garden of Europe." As we wandered through vibrant fields of tulips, hyacinths, daffodils, and artistically designed landscapes, we immersed ourselves in the beauty of nature's glory. The evening hours offered us a tranquil canal cruise through Amsterdam, gliding along the UNESCOlisted waterways, past picturesque bridges and historic buildings. The city's graceful blend of architecture, culture, and innovation revealed yet another dimension of God's creative spirit at work. There we also had time for shopping and visiting nearby museums, enriching our day with cultural immersion.

Touched by Grace: A Day of Healing and Light in Lourdes"

Day 5 of the Jubilee Pilgrimage, the 11th May, was a sacred and deeply moving experience for the entire group as the pilgrims journeyed to the holy town of **Lourdes**, **France** a place of profound healing and Marian devotion. We were privileged to participate in the Holy Eucharist celebrated in English by an Indian priest Rev Fr. Prathik OP, at St. Kolbe's Chapel, fostering a deep connection to the Lord through the intercession of Our Lady

of Lourdes as our attention captured his introductory massage: "Through Mary To Jesus".

Following the Eucharist, a local guide led the group through the historical significance of Lourdes, recounting the apparitions of the Blessed Virgin Mary to St. Bernadette and the spiritual messages she conveyed. The evening was graced with participation in the Eucharistic Procession, a solemn event where thousands of pilgrims from around the world, joined in adoration and prayer in a splendid underground Cathedral.

At twilight after supper pilgrims participated in the Candlelight Procession, a moving experience as they walked with candles in hand, singing hymns to Our Lady, immersed in a sea of flickering lights and united in prayerful silence. The beauty, grace, and healing presence of Lourdes deeply touched each participant, reaffirming their faith and strengthening their commitment to live out the JMJ charism.

On the morning of 13th June, we departed from France and journeyed to Rome, the Eternal City, arriving at our Generalate by 7:30 p.m. There, we were warmly welcomed by Sr. Mary Karickakunnel, our superior general, along with the general council, sisters from the generalate community, Monte Senario community, and Arco mission. With heartfelt joy, they received us with the traditional *arati*, and adorned each pilgrim with a stole and a pilgrimage badge. This gesture filled us with deep emotion, gratitude, and a profound sense of belonging, it was truly a joyful home coming.

An Encounter on the Sacred Precincts of Vatican City

On 14th May our pilgrimage reached its spiritual summit in Rome with the papal audience, receiving the blessing of the newly elected Pope Leo XIV- a deeply moving and globally significant event, truly a dream fulfilled.

In the afternoon, joined by our sisters in Italy and led by Sr. Mary, the Congregational head, we

undertook a **pilgrimage walk through the St. Peter's Square**, carrying the cross, praying the psalms and singing hymns, and reverently entered through the **Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica**. Inside the basilica, we spent time in prayer and contemplation, while also admiring the basilica's rich artistic and spiritual heritage, and visiting the tombs of Popes in the crypt. There are also invaluable ancient works of art and relics in these hidden grottoes. The visit renewed our faith as we offered heartfelt prayers for our congregation and for the needs of the world.

Jubilee Celebration at Monte Senario

On 15th May 2025 we started the faith journey at 8.am. enjoying the beauty of Rome passing through different significant places and visited the famous Callistus Catacomb, the official cemetery of the Church of Rome in the 3rd century, where about half a million Christians were buried, including dozens of martyrs and sixteen pontiffs. We also visited St. Sebastian's Basilica, where we saw the arrows, and part of the pillar said to have been used in his martyrdom, and the way led us to Quo vadis Domine? It is a Latin phrase meaning "Lord, where are you going?" This is the place where Jesus encountered Peter as he was running away with the fear of persecution and changed his heart and returned back to be a witness of faith in Rome.

Afternoon the long-awaited moment knocked at the door and we started our journey to join the Jubilation with the sisters of Monte Senario. We had the twin Jubilee Mass presided over by Rev. Fr. Joshtram Kureethadam SDB, and concelebrated by many other priests at the parish Church, St. Gemma Galgani, which was a spirit-filled time. After the Mass we walked to our convent at Monte Senario 57, for the festive meal and felicitation. We had an open air gathering of our sisters, well-wishers and invitees.

A felicitation program was held to honour the Sisters of Monte Senario on the occasion of the community's silver jubilee, as well as to celebrate Sr. Sarojini Kiro's silver jubilee. The celebration

was, marked by heartfelt appreciation and communal joy. As a gesture of affection and remembrance, the community presented a token gift to every member of the pilgrim group, a touching memento of this blessed journey. This day will remain etched in our hearts as a celebration of faith, fidelity, and fraternity, reminding us that we are part of a living tradition of love and mission.

Pilgrimage to Assisi

On 16th May, 2025 we visited Assisi, a place no one misses to visit when they come to Italy. We deemed ourselves privileged to witness the tomb of Carlo Acutes, the would-be young saint, whose mortal body lay intact and is venerated, where we could pray for the youth of today.

We were impressed by the beauty of the architecture and the peaceful atmosphere of the Basilica of St. Francis of Assisi, a magnificent and sacred place that stands as a testament to the life and legacy of St. Francis. We then proceeded to San Damiano, the humble church where St. Francis received his divine calling to "rebuild My Church," and our pilgrimage continued to the house of St. Clare, a simple yet powerful reminder of her unwavering devotion and commitment to a life of poverty and prayer. Some of us had the privilege of making confession at Assisi and by 4 pm we had the Holy Mass celebrated by Fr. Abin a Franciscan priest. It was a day of unforgettable memory.

17th May, 2025 was a day of grace and indulgence, the day started with renewed spirit and enthusiasm. We began our journey at 7.30 am accompanied by our superior general Sr. Mary and council and the community. We as a family of JMJ entered through the Holy Door of St. Mary Major Basilica, visited the tomb of Pope Francis and attended the Holy Mass. We could feel the sanctity that enveloped the basilica, a sacred stillness that seemed to hush even our thoughts. Next, we entered through the Holy Door of the Basilica of St. John the Lateran and humbly knelt on the Scala Santa (the Holy Stairs), believed to bear the sacred relics of Jesus's path during His Passion. We felt deeply blessed to

visit the **Gesù Church**, the mother church of the Jesuit order, where the tomb of St. Ignatius of Loyola rests in solemn splendor. There, too, lies a revered relic, the preserved right arm of St. Francis Xavier. We also had the profound opportunity to visit the Museum of St. Ignatius, where we viewed treasured relics of the saint and stood in the very room where he died.

The afternoon was marked by the entry through the Holy Door of the Basilica of St. Paul Outside the Walls, where the very chains that once bound the Apostle are preserved, a powerful and tangible reminder of his unwavering dedication to the Gospel. We then made our way to Tre Fontane (means Three Fountains), the traditional site of St. Paul's martyrdom. According to ancient tradition, when he was beheaded, his head struck the ground three times, and at each point, a spring miraculously burst forth. Our journey continued to the Shrine of Our Lady of Revelation, a deeply spiritual place where the Virgin Mary is believed to have appeared to a farmer. We also had the rapid view of the historic places like Colosseum, Castel San Angelo, UISG office etc. It was a day of exploring Rome.

18th May 2025 marked the final day of pilgrimage. In the morning, we participated in the Holy Eucharistic celebration at the parish of Our Lady of Mercede, and had some time for shopping the memories of Rome. At 2:45 p.m we gathered for an evaluation with the superior general & Council, community members and sisters from Monte Senario. Sr. Mary thanked all the pilgrims for their determination, adjustments and keeping healthy to make the Jubilee Year pilgrimage a memorable one. The evaluation ended with gratitude to God, deep appreciation to the general council for their meticulous planning and execution of the entire program. The pilgrims expressed their sincere thanks to general council and the sisters for their untiring service, care and hospitality in Rome.

At 7:00 p.m., the pilgrimage journey was concluded with a short prayer service at Generalate followed by fellowship meal. This memorable day

will remain etched in our hearts, reminding us that we are one family in JMJ, faithfully living the tradition of love.

On 19th May, we had a solemn Thanksgiving Holy Mass at our parish church, St. Theresa of Avila, offered by Rev. Fr. Cherian Thunduparampil CMI, the postulator for the Cause of Sr. Mary Glowrey in Rome, who reminded the members of the need to pray for miracles through the intercession of Mary Glowrey. With hearts full of gratitude, enriched by unforgettable experiences and cherished memories, with our spirits uplifted, we were ready to return to our motherland, India, departing at 11:00 am.

This pilgrimage was more than a journey – a sacred encounter with history, heritage, and the enduring mission of the Society of JMJ. With a heart full of gratitude, we lift our hearts in thanksgiving to God Almighty for His gracious and abundant blessings. This Jubilee Year Pilgrimage to the Netherlands, Lourdes, and Rome has been an exceptional and priceless gift to each one of us, a time of reflection, renewal, and profound spiritual enrichment. What made it even more meaningful was the privilege of walking through the sacred grounds where our beloved Society was born in the Netherlands. With deep appreciation, we extend our heartfelt thanks to our beloved superior general, Rev. Sr. Mary Karickakunnel and Council, for their visionary leadership and for organizing this enriching pilgrimage.
