- Encompassing our vessels of hope with new JMJ dynamic Spirit, giving a new expression to our Charism.

Here we are now. Still a long way to go! How do we go further?

With small steps and simple efforts from dawn to dusk seeking God's Holy Will.

Being in the Eternal City obviously we perceive the call of Pope Francis and the International Union of Superiors General (UISG), SEDOS (Service of Documentation & Study on Global Mission), JPIC (Justice, Peace & Integrity of Creation): A Joint Commission of the USG & the UISG and many more inviting to us to respond to the cry of the poor, the migrants, human trafficked, refugees, women, children and youth.

UISG Calls us to be 'Sowers of Prophetic Hope':

This is what we the women religious are called to be today: **Sowers of hope.** As consecrated women we need to ask ourselves how we nurture this hope.



- What are the signs of hope that we are gathering in our Congregation?
- Are our intercultural communities perhaps signs of hope in a world of division and war?
- How are we signs of hope for the many poor people, women and children who are suffering?

Our Congregational Commitments:

Fostering a deep spirituality in our Congregation is our priority. The Congregational Spirituality Centre at Sirumalai is the pivotal point and heart of spiritual animation for the Congregation, expected to be at the service of each sister in our Congregation. We hope that our Spirituality Centre plays a vital role in promoting a vibrant spirituality through reflective living, following through on the initiatives of the Congregational Spirituality Committee to uphold our spiritual legacy and heritage. The Spirituality centre is taking shape in few months from now and shall be officially opened on the 10 September 2019.

Strengthening Formation. Holistic and mission oriented formation is our Congregation's next priority. Pope Francis said. "Consecrated life is beautiful. It is one of the most precious treasures of the Church, rooted in the vocation of baptism. We realise well-formed vocations are more important than numerous vocations. We need to prepare more sisters for ministry of formation as much as we do everything possible to promote quality vocations for our Congregation. We entreat that our Formators possess 'a great heart for the young, to form in them great hearts, able to receive everyone, hearts rich in mercy, full of tenderness'. From July 2019 we initiate common formation programmes at Goa, Bhopal and Mangalagiri. This is a good news!

Diversity and richness of our cultures: "Interculturality" is a sign of prophetic hope for humanity. In our communities we are called to build an atmosphere of love, joy and mutual trust in one another for the sake of our mission. By our own experience of living together, valuing and mutually transforming all our 'differences,' with the doors opening inwards, puts us on the path to go out to meet those who are different, marginalized, and exploited today.

Sowers of Prophetic Hope by Caring for Creation:

"LAUDATO SI', mi' Signore" – "Praise be to you, my Lord." These are the words that open Pope Francis' encyclical on ecology and care for God's creation. These words, quoting St. Francis of Assisi's beautiful canticle, reminds us that our common home is like a sister with whom we share our life and a beautiful mother who opens her arms to embrace us. Prophetic hope exists on the margins and is rooted in solidarity



with the sufferings of those in the margins. Caring for our planet is becoming an imperative in expressing our love of neighbour. Loving our neighbours must include doing what we can to enable our planet to sustain the flourishing of our fellow human beings.

Religious are essential to the Church's mission: Pope Francis highlights the importance of the work of consecrated religious in the daily life of the Church. "Religious, with their prayer, poverty, and patience, are essential to the Church's mission", the Pope remarks. Our Founder had envisioned almost two centuries ago that we work passionately with women, youth and children especially those who are trafficked, forced to migrate and oppressed by abject poverty is now our priority.

Collaboration and networking with other Congregations: We are never alone for wherever we are we form part of one big family with the same objective, that of weaving a better life for all ...that they may have life and have it to the full (John10:10). Networking is the new approach to mission. This has been true for our Congregation in Rome. As membership of religious congregations decrease - in inverse proportion to the growing demands of mission - no community can effectively carry out its mission by itself. We experience effectiveness of our collaboration in our working with the Hospitaller sisters of mercy in the area of geriatric care.

Lay partners in our mission: 'Laypeople are on the front line of the life of the Church,' the Pope said, urging the Church to be thankful for the laity 'who take risks, who are not afraid and who offer reasons for hope to the poorest, to the excluded, to the marginalized.' Let us hope to create and strengthen co-responsibility for our mission with lay partners and encourage collaboration and networking with other Congregations and agencies at all levels to respond to the anguish of the world by taking courageous steps to go to the frontiers where God is calling us.

As a final point in our endeavour, Sr. Mary Karickakunnel is closely following up of the beatification process of Sr. Dr. Mary of the Sacred Heart (Dr. Mary Glowrey), the Servant of God. The diocesan phase is completed and the Roman phase has been initiated. Two of our sisters Kochumary Challakudam and Swarna Yeruva have successfully completed the Course on Causes of Saints organised by the Congregation for the Causes of Saints (Latin: Congregatio de Causis Sanctorum), Vatican.

Our call to be Vessels of hope sets us on fire. So we march ahead on the journey of hope working passionately to actualize the goals set before us, walking humbly with God, with trust in His promise, blooming in the mission entrusted to us, giving more and more, better and better , greater and greater for the glory of God.

May the Holy Spirit enable us to light a flame of prophetic hope in present realities and embrace the future possibilities with faith and surrender.

A LUMINARY OF INNER BEAUTY - MARY GLOWREY

Sr. Mary was a 'special creation of God' as Bishop Ignatius Mummadi presented her in his homily at the Requiem Mass offered for her on 06 May 1957. From childhood, Mary had obtained many special privileges including the favour of her teachers and being much more loved by her parents and siblings. She was a gifted girl and woman. As she grew she continued to shine as the *FIRST* in many instances of her life. She was one among the first three women to study medicine from Melbourne University. Though successfully passed her M.B.B.S Examination, being a woman she was not eligible for the post of resident doctor at the Melbourne Hospital. She got her first appointment at Christ Church Hospital, New Zealand thus she became the first woman resident doctor in New Zealand.

She was the first president of the Catholic Women's Social Guild established by Fr. Lockington in 1916 in order to uplift the women and children. In 1920, the Society of JMJ in India had to get special permission from Rome to begin a novitiate, as the new candidate arrived and she was the first JMJ Novice in India. Thus in God's plan she became the first JMJ Religious professed in India on November 29, 1921. After her temporary profession, Dr. Mary Glowrey known as Sr. Mary of the Sacred Heart became the first nun-doctor-missionary and participated in the healing ministry of the Eternal Healer, again after having received special permission from the Holy See. She became the first President of the Catholic Health Association of India (CHAI) which she founded in 1943 with great vision in order to contribute more through the healthcare ministry.

More than these achievements, her inner beauty is being recognized by everyone who came in contact with her. The spontaneous responses of people in Guntur, Australia and around the world after her death are expressions of this: The Resolution passed by the Indian Red Cross Society on the occasion of celebration of the International Red Cross Day on 08 May 1957 states, "Sr. Mary was always smiling, cheerful and hard working. She worked as a Doctor for



thirty six full years in Guntur with the zeal of a missionary and brought happiness and life to so many people". For Capt. V. Anantaram, a Hindu ophthalmic surgeon from Guntur, her life has been as great as that of the Holy Virgin and she had been the kindest Doctor ever lived. 2

Her life was most inspiring to many and even immediately after her death there were people who were not at all surprised to hear of her canonization.³ People recognized her as holy and saintly

whose healing touch brought relief and comfort to the thousands of suffering men and women, who lived a dedicated life – dedicated to the love and service of God and of His poor suffering children.⁴ A Benedictine monk, who was a distant relation of Sr. Mary Glowrey, declared decades ago, that one day she will be elevated to the Altars where the virtues of her life will radiate all around the world particularly for the benefit of the

doctors who laboured under so many temptations and false approaches.5

Others considered her as a perfect religious who never let her outside activities run away with her. Her wonderful humility and spirit of zeal was appreciated and people felt her presence and her holiness as an example for everyone.⁶ She was a model religious and a model doctor whose loss was not only for the JMJ Society or for Guntur alone but for the whole Catholic Church in India.⁷ Her life was a living testimony to the charity of Christ, charity which made her to leave her native Australia and labour and die in India for its people.⁸

She was a wonderful example, a good religious whose heart and soul devoted to the advancement of the medical mission apostolate in India. Miss. Mary Naidu, one of the Members of the Parliament in those days, had written a beautiful and very inspiring letter about Sr. Mary: "Sr. Mary is a saint, a person of great brilliance, a person vital and vivid, a person with so many gifts but above all a gift of understanding which made her unique. To me she was a mother, a teacher and a goddess. While living she guided me and now after death I still go to her and cry out my heart to her. To me she is not dead she is ever by my side". 10

Sr. Mary Glowrey could live her life to the full as she directed her life always according to the holy will of God and guided by the Holy Spirit. It is said that she never began or ended anything without praying to the Holy Spirit. We, as JMJs are proud to have such a saintly person lived among us. Let us imitate her life of charity, generosity, humility and service giving ourselves completely in the mission entrusted to us with total dedication and commitment being open to the inspirations of the Spirit. It is for each one of us to reflect today: Is my life an inspiration and example for others? By looking at my life will people be able to say, my life is a witness, an example and I live a holy and saintly life? If yes, let us praise and thank the Lord for the graces! If not, let us plead the Lord for His grace and be transformed.

The influence of the Servant of God did not end with her bodily death. It continues in the lives of the people who seek her intercession and experience freedom from sickness and receive other favours. Let us pray that she be soon raised to the altar of God and pray to her for our personal, community, family, congregational and world needs especially for the sick and suffering.

An Encounter story of Sr. Suze Lases with centenarian (Indian Missionary who lived for a century by 26th April 2019)

'Since 27 April 2018, we have a new identity with a new name...'

How did Sr. Regula, with her 23 years in India, experience this first sentence in our new information bulletin: 'ICON SJMJ'?

I decided to ask her, to interview her:

Would it suit you if I came to see you on Thursday?

'Let me see if I'm free'.

'Shall I come to see you at 2.30pm'?

'Come at 2.00pm'.

And there she is, this amiable, dignified, 100-year-old woman.

'I think this is the first time you've come to visit me in my room? Would you like something to drink?'

'I'm fine thank you. I had a coffee downstairs'.

'Oh yes, in the Plaza'.

'So, this is why I'm here'. I pull out ICON and ask my question.

I've not seen it before; I'm no longer able to read and there is no one around who can read it to me. Our contact person, a lovely woman, works hard, two days per week. She would read to me, but time's short and she has lots to do. When I arrived here 8 years ago then I could still do everything. But now, I find it very difficult to walk and to see. But I would really like someone to read it to me, but people would need more time to do this.

When you ask me what I felt when we became two congregations, then my answer is, a great deal of pain! You felt very much as one with the Indian sisters, very familiar with each other, so fine! They

were such lovely people! The others out of Indonesia are also very lovely, but I don't know them in the same way. However, it is good. It had to happen.

Previously, Riet (de Jager) would read to me and we would chat together about everything that was going on in the Society of JMJ. Now Bep (Koopmeiners) is here and has to lie flat on her bed and can't even turn her head. So, in the afternoon, Riet goes to her, and I say: "If you feel that you need to be with Bep, then that's fine with me". This is not a problem for me, you understand! I pray a lot, listen to radio Maria, pray the rosary and listen to Holy Mass if there is not one here, and I have talking books. Over there is my chapel (opposite to her are two small covered tables, on which stand various images, including those of beloved saints.) I pray until 10.00 am and then, well and truly 'charged up', I go to coffee!

Did you want to go to India?

I was asked to go there! I was with the elderly in Roelofarendsveen. My sister Lien, Sr. Lidwina, also wanted to go. She was five years older than me. (Except for my younger brother, I was the youngest of eleven children. Here, in the Bongerd, I cared for my sister for three years. It was not easy being together in the same house, she bossed me over).

When I arrived in India, the Dutch sisters no longer kept themselves separate from the Indian sisters. People mixed together, and that was fine! We were all one together, we really learned to get to know each other; we could really rely on each other! Such lovely people! Every day, I pray the rosary in full for the general council in India, and for the general council in Indonesia. Those younger sisters need it, they are people of this time.

What was it like to come back to the Netherlands?

In 1961, I came back to the Netherlands on holiday for the first time after 11 years. Everything was strange and I wanted to go back to India as fast as possible. Of course, in those days you expected to spend the rest of your life in the place where you had been sent out to, yes?

In 1973 I came back again, this time with Mother Ferdinando and Landelino. It was difficult! This time, I was not allowed to go back but Landelino could return! Mother Marie said: "It is over for you there!" It was terrible! Everything was different! And people were wearing different clothes in the congregation in the Netherlands! But I kept wearing my habit. And the church…everything was so strange here.

You felt out of place?

Yes, out of place!!! My sisters asked too much of me. It was terrible! I became sick. I had an operation in Boxmeer, where the doctor was very good, and the nurses were lovely. My brother came every Friday from Schiedam to see me and brought me flowers! I was very ill, and it took me a year to get better.

Yes, you were very ill! When Hedwig visited you, I went with her and waited somewhere, I also came to say hello to you.

Back in St. Agatha, I found that there was no longer a place for me! So, then I went to Weesp, (two fellow sisters from India) and from there I found myself in Hoogerheide. But what could they do with someone who was still half sick? They were certainly not going to hang around for me.

After this I went to Mariënbosch, where I came across many fine people and thought: "You might wear different clothes, but you can also be fine sisters. I don't need to exalt myself". So, I adapted to things. My priestly brother found it difficult and wanted to show off with me.

And now you are here.

It's good to be here, and people are all the same. That's really lovely! We're here with Anacleta (Mrs. Clement) and Gerion (Mrs. De Jong).

Now we're together celebrating, for three days, the one-hundredth birthday of Thea Kuijpers (she has serious dementia). We are enjoying the fact that Thea has reached this age! There are

flowers everywhere and the lady Mayoress is visiting, such a lovely woman! Look, here she is at my 80th birthday celebration. And yes, three of them on this photo have passed away.

Trees Schiloo was there and also Cor (Dominicus) and Margret (van Winden). We really miss them; yes, it really affects me inside! These days there are three of us here. Other people can certainly come to see us but we (Jacobi Engelen, Corrie de Vette en Regula) live together here.

And then with visible excitement, Sr. Regula says: On the 26 April she, the Mayoress, is coming back! (The photo from 3 years ago, with the lady Mayoress, is there on the table).

You were one of the first sisters to use the internet.

Yes, but for the past year I'm no longer able to use it. I can't differentiate things anymore. But I really enjoyed



using it in the past. I was able to look everything up, also many psalms and pictures! At that time in 's-Hertogenbosch, when I was 87 years old, Emmanuel (v. Greunsven) also found someone to help me: the wife of the Mayor! Oh, those Tuesday afternoons were wonderful. She taught me things and we chatted together about everything! She still comes to see me (from Limburg). When I go to eat my dinner, she stays in my room and eats her sandwich. Then, I say to her:' this is now your house, please help yourself to some broth or something.'

My eyesight is not good enough to use the mobility scooter, but when the weather is nice outside then I can go out for a walk with my walking frame. And when it comes to my work, well, I pray. I don't just pray for the sisters but for all people! Perhaps I shall reach my hundredth birthday so that I can keep on praying.

It's time to leave, but first here is a cup of tea.

"Would you like a posh cup or a mug?"

Outside, I find myself joyfully thinking: What a woman! A person who, according to Sr. Valsa, is full of grace.

She is so involved, and she wants to be involved in the changes which touch her life, and the lives of us all!



WOLFF'S VISION RADIATES

Encounter of Love and Mercy at DORNAHALLI

"You're not disabled by the disabilities you have, you are able by the abilities you have"

Children with special needs are the "handy work" of God, created in His likeness and image. They have the right to live a dignified life and enjoy a good status in our society. We consider it as a privilege to serve the children with Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Mental Retardation and Multiple Disabilities of the age groups from 8 to 25 years.

These children are often left behind and frequently victims of neglect, abuse and violence. This is contrary to their rights: they should be able to participate equally and fully, at home and in their communities - and live a life to the highest possible standard.

As per our study the overall situation of the target Children with disabilities -

- Struggle for their daily life existence having been isolated from the mainstream of the community.
- 90% children with disabilities do not have access to special schools meant for these children.
- Their parents, teachers and the government officials are totally indifferent with negative attitude toward these children's education.

At present we have 55 children at our JMJ Residential School for differently abled children. Our sisters and staff are agents of love and mercy caring for these most deserving children.

Our vision for our Children: Our dream for the future is that children with disabilities are equal and participate as fully as possible in their homes and their communities. Their lives have the highest possible quality.

Our mission for our Children: Our mission is in line with UN Rights of Persons with Disabilities. It is empowering children enabling the environment for better living. Child Empowerment means increasing the child's personal, social, educational and economic strengths. The strategy consists of two elements: the development of children (Child Development) and the accessibility of their environment (Enabling Environment). All our efforts are aimed at the development of the child to the extent possible to live quality life in the community.

Health check-ups: Regular health check is done with the help of Government doctors. Every child is provided suitable aids and appliances based on their degree of disability by the Government hospital.

Family counseling in the villages

One of the main fears in the beginning of our mission was the non-cooperation of the parents in the disability rehabilitation of the children. They are of the belief that nothing can be done for

mentally challenged persons and there is no use for any training. They think that these people are destined to be so. To overcome this problem we organise regular parents' awareness programmes and family counselling. Now the parents and people in the society understand that through training programme these children could be integrated into the mainstream of the society.

"We Ring the Bell" Campaign: An initiation of CHAI- Liliane Foundation

On the 13th March 2019 "We Ring the Bell" campaign was held at Government school to strengthen the inclusive education of these children. The objective of this event was to encourage the children to "ring the bell" and make noise in the school yards, using drums, horns and all kinds of instruments to draw the attention of policy makers and the public to know the struggles of these children.

All the well children from the schools around made loud noise for one minute through beating drums, ringing bells, clapping hands etc. as a mark of their acceptance and support to their differently-able friends. With this campaign we brought the awareness among the people on the importance of inclusive education of differently-able children.







Our united efforts of encounter of love and mercy among these innocent children fills us with abundance of God's Mercy and never ending inner joy! We are ever grateful to the JMJ Bangalore Province and the CHAI – Liliane Foundation for the financial aid in support of this project. We are blessed with so many good people who share in our mission of mercy through their generous contribution of food, books, school bags etc. Our children with disabilities certainly make a lasting impression to live our lives with gratitude!



JMJ UJJAWALA HOME - A BEACON OF LIGHT

Trafficking of women and children for commercial sexual exploitation is an organized crime that violates basic human rights. The problem of trafficking of women and children for commercial sexual exploitation is especially challenging due to its myriad complexities and variation. Poverty, low status of women, lack of a protective environment etc. are some of the causes for trafficking.

Government of India, Ministry of Women and Child Development has formulated a Central "Comprehensive Scheme for Prevention of Trafficking for Rescue, Rehabilitation and Re-Integration of Victims of Trafficking for Commercial Sexual Exploitation – named as Ujjawala".

JMJ Social Service Society, Guntur Province has accepted to become an implementing agency of this Scheme at **JMJ UJJAWALA HOME**, **Nambur ever since 2010**. The aim of this component is to control and change the traffickers mind for future sustainability provision.

Rehabilitation: The major component we focus upon here is rehabilitation of the victims.

- * Setting up of Protective and Rehabilitative (P&R) Home we have set up our JMJ Ujjawala home with all facilities to protect and rehabitate the inmates.
- **Basic amenities** we provide basic amenities such as food, clothing and other items of personal use.
- * Medical Care This Scheme provides Doctor's fee, cost of medicines, hospitalization, appropriate linkages to de-addiction centres. Since the victims of trafficking undergo immense psychological trauma, professional counselling services are provided through a qualified clinical psychologist and psychiatrist.
- **Legal Aid** As victims are the main witnesses against the trafficker/ perpetrator, or to claim their right to property, marital rights, divorce, maintenance and custody of children, they need to be provided with legal aid which would include court work and documentation relating to the victims court cases.
- *** Education** As a large proportion of the rescued victims are children, they need to be inducted in to the formal or open school system, for which some expenditure on text-books, notebooks, stationary, school uniform and other incidental expenses are incurred and met by our home.





Activities for the inmates in our Home:

- * Every morning all the inmates practice yoga & meditation for 30 minutes.
- * Personality development programs are arranged by the experts to strengthen their confidence and re-build themselves.
- * Self awareness and spiritual help is offered to them to overcome their anguish and promote relaxation and prepare them to change their life for better.
- * Based on the individual need, psychotherapy and counseling are given.
- * Indoor and outdoor games are organized on a regular basis.
- * Occasionally recreational tours and cultural programs are arranged
- * Skill training is provided i.e. tailoring garments, dyeing and printing, computer embroidery, bag making, jute work, block & batik printing, bangle and ear rings making, and sari rolling.
- * Exhibitions are arranged at nearby college hostels, women groups, and in Government organized forums.



Mode of rehabilitation: Reunion with the family / Formal training / Skill trainings / Self- employment/Job Placement and settling for family life.

My experience

Indeed I am glad to render my service for the women trafficked and help them live with dignity and respect. Often is a big challenge working with the trafficked

victims, the situation is disturbing, and the responses by the victims concerned are saddening. But being with them and understanding their responses, I have realized that it is the trafficked victim who gets further victimized, violated and more often re-trafficked and forced to continue to support the family.

JMJ UJJAWALA Home receives positive support from Police departments, First-class mobile courts from all districts of Andhra Pradesh and Department of Women Development and Child care. Giving our inmates life back into their hands gives me an immense joy and fulfillment. I have many success stories to share. By the support of my JMJ community at Nambur, we could settle seven of our inmates through successful marriages. All the inmates undergone vocational training, master special skills and get self-employed eventually. Every year we celebrate Shalom Session on 25th December and all the married couples with their families participate and share their joys of life.

TO BUILD AND TO PLANT GYAN JYOTHI FORMATION HOUSE, BHOPAL

The first batch of the formees landed here on 30th July 2015 and it was recorded as a remarkable day in Hyderabad Province. Eventually Novitiate and Pre-novitiate programmes are organised here.

Gyan Jyothi offers a conducive atmosphere for all round development of the young formees. Initiating, motivating, guiding, teaching and accompanying them to take a striking 'U' turn to the consecrated life chosen by them is a challenging and exciting task of the Formators here. The young members' response, cooperation, openness and receptivity to learn and form themselves is indeed very marvellous! They are imbibed with the Spirit and Charism of the Congregation and comprehend the essence of the gospel values taught by Jesus Christ.

Preparing the formees to become persons of God, persons with conviction to follow the way of Christ in his mission of mercy and compassion is the most important area of formation.

Constant guidance, counselling and the processes of discernment helps the formees to experience God's working ways and respond to them profoundly. In different ways and means all of us form ourselves to incarnate in our own life the presence of Christ.

The personalized formation is offered to each individual person to advance at her own speed of time and attain the gradual growth of maturity to respond to one's own vocation. Equal attention is given to the integral formation of a person having physical, psychological, social and spiritual dimensions of life.

Accepting responsibility to be a Formator involves taking risk and being accountable for the formation of young members of our congregation. Consequently, our task as Formators requires of us inner serenity, availability, patience, understanding, and a true affection for those who have been confided to the formation responsibility. And, therefore it's good to be Formators, because it is a privilege to participate in the work of the Father who forms the heart of the Son in those whom the Spirit has called.'

Pope further said, one of the qualities of a Formator is that of having a great heart for young people, to form big hearts in them, capable of receiving all, hearts rich in mercy, full of tenderness.

You are not only friends and companions of the consecrated life of those who are entrusted to you, but true fathers, true mothers, capable of asking and of giving them the most: to generate a life, to give birth to a religious life. And this is possible only through love, the love of fathers and mothers. And it's not true that young people of today are mediocre and not generous;

Care and Share Trust lavishes on them love and these babies are really lucky to be in this charitable trust home because they are cared and served with tender love and affection.

For me it was the first experience in life and I really appreciate and value the opportunity given to me to be with them. They taught me to become a loving, patient, sympathetic and compassionate person.

Working with an NGO like this has given me greater opportunity for the evangelization. Our commitment and our values in mission are a public revelation and witness of the life beyond. Living in Care and Share Charitable Trust for the past two years gave me a new insight to life and great opportunity of working for the poorest of the poor and needy. Now I say with Prophet Isaiah, "The spirit of the Lord is upon me, because He has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."

I accord my appreciation to our Provincial Council for having given me an opportunity to experience life with the orphans and poor children.

VINEELA INSPIRED ME TO 'WALK AN EXTRA MILE'

In 2007, I got a post card from a girl of class 7 inviting me for the annual day function at Shameerpet, Telangana State, India. That reminded of me about Vineela who was studying in Government school an inmate of an orphanage run by a Non-government Organization (NGO). In 2003, I was a sister-teacher at St. Joseph's High school, Gajwel. I noticed two girls about the ages 7 and 10 years begging for their livelihood. They looked shabby, dirty and unclean. On the next day I traced their home. They belonged to a tribe called 'Vagabonds'.



They live in tents in the open places. They lost their father at an early age. Their mother was a beads' seller going from house to house to the villages with a basket. She used to start her work early in morning and return home at late evening. There were altogether four children two girls and two boys. Both girls were elders. They have to look after their younger brothers. I instructed the mother not to send the girls for begging and educate them freely. Having consented the mother, I provided clothes from well to do families and bought lunch boxes to collect mid-day meals. Both girls joined school in the month of January into class 1st. They enthusiastically started to learn alphabets. After a week the first girl did not turn up to school.

Again I visited the mother and enquired about the girl. The reason was her younger sons were left alone as the elder girls come to school. In her absence at least the eldest girl need to be at home and look after them. Moreover the girl herself felt out of place as she was of 10 years age and big in the class. I took promise from the mother not to stop the younger girl. Special attention was given to her to learn things easily. I persuaded the younger girl to be regular to school till the end of academic year.

During summer vacation on one Sunday morning at the parish church I met sisters of Holy Cross who run an orphanage funded by a NGO at Shameerpet. I requested to admit Vineela into their Orphanage. The sisters agreed and took her immediately at that hour on the same day along with them. With the consent of her mother I entrusted the girl without any baggage and not even a pair of shoes into the loving care of sisters.

During holidays sisters taught basics in reading, writing and arithmetic (3Rs). At the beginning of the new academic year they joined her in government school at Shameerpet in class 4th. She was the best in curricular, co-curricular and cultural activities. She was awarded first rank in class 7. Since they were nomads I could not trace her whereabouts after that. But I believe that she must have been a teacher by now at least with TTC qualification as she promised to me that she will be a teacher educating all her near and dear ones. Likewise I educated a poor employee with third class upgraded as Computer teacher, a class five dropout to study General Nursing and a class ten dropout to became a teacher with PG qualification.

These little acts of love and kindness flashed my memory as I continue to teach less privileged tribal children at our St. Joseph's School, Nagarjunasagar.

JMJ COLLABORATIVE MINISTRY AT BEL-AIR HOSPITAL, PANCHGANI

Bel-Air was founded by Dr. Rustomji Billimoria in 1912 as a TB Sanatorium, to control the spread of TB in India. The control of the hospital is under the Indian Red Cross. In January, 2003 Fr. Tomy was the key note speaker at the Sister Doctors Forum of India, conducted at Mumbai. Dr. Sr. Rosily and Dr. Sr. Lillian (the then Provincial) attended the meeting. Sr. Rosily was inspired by the ministry of Fr. Tomy for HIV/AIDS at Bel-Air Hospital, Panchgani and volunteered to work at Bel-Air. With her previous experience in HIV/AIDS care in Ghana, she joined Bel-Air June, 2003. During her service there, she did her fellowship in HIV Medicine from Christian Medical College, Vellore and rendered her service for six years.



Fr. Tomy was instrumental that JMJ continues to collaborate working at Bel-Air College of Nursing. Sr. Lillian readily agreed to lend sisters for this ministry. Sr. Martha Thirumalreddy and Sr. Joyamma worked from 2006 to 2011, followed by Sr. Lourdu Mary Nagothu from 2011 to 2018 and Sr. Amala Xavier from 2018. During these years Bel-Air College of Nursing steadily became one of the best colleges of nursing in Maharashtra state and now is rated as one of the top nursing colleges in India. The College is in collaboration with University of Illinois, Chicago and Colombia University, New York.



JMJ sisters deputed to Bel-Air also received training and exposure to international expertise. Sr. Rosily and Sr. Martha were sent to Chicago. Later Sr. Lourdu Mary had ongoing visits and trainings in Chicago. She was part of developing a Masters of Nursing HIV/AIDS curriculum with the help of UIC and received the Excellence in Global HIV award from the Association of Nurses in AIDS Care in 2017 at Dallas conference, USA.

JMJ sisters started working in **St. Xavier's School** from 2012 which is adjacent to Bel-Air Hospital. Sr. Catherine James and Sr. Jessy Cheemalapenta worked in the school and Sr. Shobha Rani Polisetti is the headmistress. The school has a founding partnership with school of EUMIND (Europe Meets India). As part of the program Sr. Shobha visited Belgium with a group of students. St. Xavier's gives an opportunity to JMJ Sisters to be better educators.

The mission at Panchgani has also given the opportunity for the JMJs to be partners in various national and international programs. Fr. Tomy facilitated St. Joseph's College of Nursing, Nellore to be a sub-recipient of Global Fund Grant (GFATM) and a partner training institute of Indian Nursing Council. Being inspired by services of JMJ Sisters at Bel-air; Johnson & Johnson has sanctioned annual grants to ANM program at Nellore.

Our sisters living in Bel-Air are able take decisions, to live according to the spirit and charism of the Congregation and stand for Christian values, serving the poor through the healthcare and education ministry in an unknown culture and language. It's our privilege to be witnesses of JMJ Spirit at Bel- air!

MY CALL TO JMJ - A DIVINE ENTERPRISE

Call to be a Christian

I, Sr. Josephine Miriyala hail from a traditional Hindu family. I am the youngest of three children to my parents. After my father's untimely death, I was admitted to a boarding school run by JMJ sisters in Nellore. While I was in the boarding, I used go to church daily along with catholic children. There arose a great desire within me to become a Catholic. When I was in standard 7, I was baptized as 'Mary Josephine' (Venkat Narayanamma) on August 11th and received first Holy Communion on August 15th. Eventually my mother and brother too received baptism. By seeing the faith of my family, my married sister and brother-in-law received baptism and enabled also all their four sons as born Catholics.



Call to be a religious in the Society of Jesus Mary Joseph (JMJ)

When I was in standard 8 in Nellore, I had an admiration for sisters of JMJ, some Dutch missionaries who took care of little children. I heard an inner voice calling me to be a religious like them to serve God and his people. We celebrated my brother's wedding while I was in Teaching training course at JMJ Training School in Kurnool. Later on I got a government teacher post at JMJ sisters School at Porumamilla. It was at this place that God prompted me again of my hidden desire to be a religious, which took root during my standard 8. This time the call was so strong that I left the government post and refused the will of my family members to get me married.

Through the advice of JMJ sisters, I took a strong decision to follow Christ through JMJ Society. On June 1971, I entered into JMJ religious formation as an aspirant at Guntur. I became an instrument to pave the way to about 16 girls to be religious in JMJ Society and five boys including my own nephew to become priests in Catholic Church.

Call to be a missionary

After my retirement I was sent a missionary to Ghana, Africa. I surrendered to God in faith and said *yes* to be a missionary in overseas. I am most happy having served at JMJ School, Atebubu, for six full years and returned for good due to my ill health. God chased me to promote vocations in Ghana region too.

I am ever grateful to the Congregation of JMJ for providing me great many opportunities to upgrade myself to post graduation and serve as a teacher, headmistress, principal in educational institutions and superior of the communities. with Him and to be sent out. The Lord strengthens me every time I start to drift away in every aspect of my life, be it physical, social, spiritual or emotional.



MYRIADS OF MISSION

MISSIONARY ZEAL FROM GHANA RADIATES HOPE

I always count myself as one of the blessed missionaries of JMJ Congregation in the world wide. That significant day of the month of July, 1999 still remains fresh in my memory as my flight safely landed at the Kotoka International Airport in Accra.

Not only that I was young but I was also inexperienced of life abroad. Even though I had warm welcome by both the students and sisters of Atebubu JMJ community, I must confess that home suits home. However, since it was a divine call I had no option than to adapt and readapt to that situations of life outside India.

I gradually and carefully studied the situations on the ground as far as both the community and outside the community are concerned. There, it was like day and night for I had to deal with people of different backgrounds in terms of culture and tradition whereby "Akwabaa" and "fufu" were respectively the welcome and the staple food of the people. They are friendly and Godly.



My success in Ghana depends solely on the respect for moral values and the sense of "we feeling". I got to know this when I was asked to head the primary school at Atebubu. However it was a challenge to me in that the oral English in Ghana was a little bit different from that of my country. Even if the parent is educated, the tone, the pronunciation and the use of everyday vocabulary are purely for the British unlike the India. I took the pain to study these entire things one after the other.



My tour in the country also made me clear that the food basket of Ghana is the Brong Ahafo Region. Thanks be to God, I overcame every obstacle as with God all things are possible and also determination leads to success.

Not sooner than later, I became acquainted with things here of my first station Atebubu. Then I was transferred to the Western part of the same Brong Ahafo Region to teach in Girls Secondary School at Kwasibuokrom (KBK). I had no option than to go but the situation was quite different here; in that the adolescent girls are neither young nor grown up and the school itself was very small in terms infrastructure and the population. For instance as of that time the total population of the school was 40 with only one structure. But now I can brag of over 900 students and four story building. Glory be to God for His abundant grace on me.

And so from day one of the 2001, I had to readjust myself to the new situation at KBK in terms of curriculum, new context and people. I was more confused over the lifestyles of the young girls here unlike in Atebubu where the primary pupils take simple instructions here is different altogether. In addition that was a transition period taking over the management of the School from the American sisters to the JMJ sisters.

As an Assistant head, I had to merge the teaching and the discipline together in order to shape the behaviors of these young girls so that after the school life they will be able to fit into the society. I took the mantle of administration whole heartedly and called a spade a spade. I left no stone unturned. I worked hand in hand with Sr. Rosy the headmistress to elevate the school to a high level.

I again took the opportunity to learn more about the culture of the people. I further understood that in Ghana, much emphasis is laid on the communal values like the extended family, paying homage to the chiefs and respect for the traditional rulers and elders in all spheres.

I also felt that these students need to have the primary moral education which are parental care and love as the formal education deprived them from regular contacts with their biological parents. I am happy that I could transform many young girls from the destructive attitudes to the positive ones. Many are those who won the India High Commissioner's award to pursue the first Degree courses in the various universities in India.

Additionally, many of my products are living well across the length and breadth of the nation, Ghana. The community is always proud of my achievements for the caliber of young women I produce every academic year to the community and to the nation at large.

As the popular saying goes "if you do somebody's thing well, God will also do yours well". With this I am to say that my Lord God has taken me through all the educational ranks easily. I attended only one interview for each of the grades until I am now at the apex. Many are those who try these ranks severally to no avail.

In addition, I studied my Masters in Administration from the University of Cape Coast; the premier university of education in Ghana from 2016 to 2018. I am very grateful unto the Almighty God and the Congregation of Jesus Mary Joseph granting opportunity to become missionary!

We are delighted that our JMJ presence is highly esteemed by the bishop of Gallup and Fr. Pat who is our spiritual father and the people as well. Yes, since the year.... we are part of this great mission making a difference in the lives of the people in general and children in our school in particlular.

We encounter students who suffer from acute behavior problems, depression and lack motivation for learning. Call of the Church: Laudato Si (Praise Be to You) and SDGs

It is already five years since the United Nations General Assembly adopted the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) in 2015 by 193 States, as the major international consensus on integral human development. Pope Francis made a major contribution to the fundamental principles underpinning the SDGs through his Encyclical **Laudato Si** and adoption of the 2030 Agenda Declaration and the 17 Goals which constitute the SDGs. It should also be recalled that Pope Francis addressed the United Nations General Assembly before the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development was tabled for adoption. Catholic Development Agencies led by Caritas Internationalis and the Holy See Mission in New York also actively engaged in the Intergovernmental Negotiations (IGN) processes that championed the drafting and negotiating the Declaration and the 17 Goals of the 2030 Agenda.

Pope Francis urges personal conversion in implementing Sustainable Development Goals

Pope Francis said, that global development goals need to be supported by ethical objectives stemming from personal conversion and recognition of one's failures. "The economic and political objectives must be supported by ethical objectives, which presuppose a change of attitude, the Bible would say a change of heart" Francis emphasized that "for a correct transition to a sustainable future, it is necessary to recognize 'one's own mistakes, sins, vices or negligence,' to repent of heart, to change from within,' to be reconciled with others, with creation and with the Creator" (Pope's 2015 encyclical on the environment, Laudato si')

International Conference on "Religions and the Sustainable Development Goals

The Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development, together with the Pontifical Council for Inter-religious Dialogue at the Vatican, convened an International Conference on "Religions and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)" at the New Synod Hall, Vatican City from 7 – 9 March, 2019. The Conference adopted the pedagogy of *SEE, JUDGE, ACT* to assess status of global implementation, gain deeper understanding of the SDGs in the light of faith and agreed on the unique contributions that Religions can make to promote and to implement the SDGs. The Conference emphasized the interconnections among all 17 distinct goals and 169 associated targets of the 2030 Agenda by what is known as the five "Ps": PEOPLE, PLANET, PROSPERITY, PEACE and PARTNERSHIP.

The Supreme Pontiff re-echoed the need for inclusive approaches that ensures that the poor are not left behind, development that ensures the integrity of creation, recognition of the rights of indigenous peoples and the important role of Faith Groups and International cooperation. https://www.un.org/sustainabledevelopment/wp-/SDG_Guidelines_January_2019.pdf

Sr Judette Gallares said "prophetic hope is rooted in the prophetic experience of mysticism, which aligns the prophet with God's plan and vision.... The prophet's closeness to God enables him to see the entire creation—the universe, the planet and everything in it from God's perspective".

Those who embrace such a vocation today need to tell: "to lament environmental destruction and evoke the memory of God's dream for creation, raising consciousness of the global ecocide that threatens humanity and the entire planet in the here and now".

Women religious, following the intuition of Jeremiah, have always found God's presence among the "broken and dispossessed, the captured and conquered", the "vulnerable and innocent".

"Prophetic hope exists on the margins and is rooted in solidarity with the sufferings of those in the margins.... Caring for our planet is becoming an imperative in expressing our love of neighbour...

Loving our neighbours must include doing what we can to enable our planet to sustain the flourishing of our fellow human beings".

The prophetic vocation of women religious to that of Jesus himself who was "deeply connected with everything that came into being as spoken by his Father". Living in continuity with the prophets of old, women religious embrace lives that "bring wholeness and healing to our broken and vulnerable planet". Inspired by St Paul's words to the Romans, by groaning with all of creation that "we await the redeeming power of God's love restoring the original goodness and beauty of all there is".

UISG Initiative

UISG, in response to call of the Universal Church to care for the creation as sowers of hope for the future, a web site was developed (www.sowinghopefortheplanet.org), a newsletter created, and a video demonstrating how congregations "are engaging in many important works" was realized. Besides networking with UISG member congregations, the campaign is also networked with the Global Catholic Climate Movement and with the Vatican Dicastery for the Promotion of Integral Human Development.

UISG invites every member congregation to participate in the campaign:

"As international congregations we need to look at the ways we have been guilty of environmental destruction and disregard for these consequences to one another and especially to the poor. Sisters are present in countries where the lifestyle negatively impacts the rise in temperature, effecting climate change and where they are most affected by climate change. Our communities are both intimate with the cause and effect. With our personal commitment to one another, we are ideally positioned to respond compassionately in an integrated effort. As a community of Sisters living the Gospel, in solidarity with one another, we know that everything is interconnected, and we wish to live our religious life for the common good in our environment, our common home."
