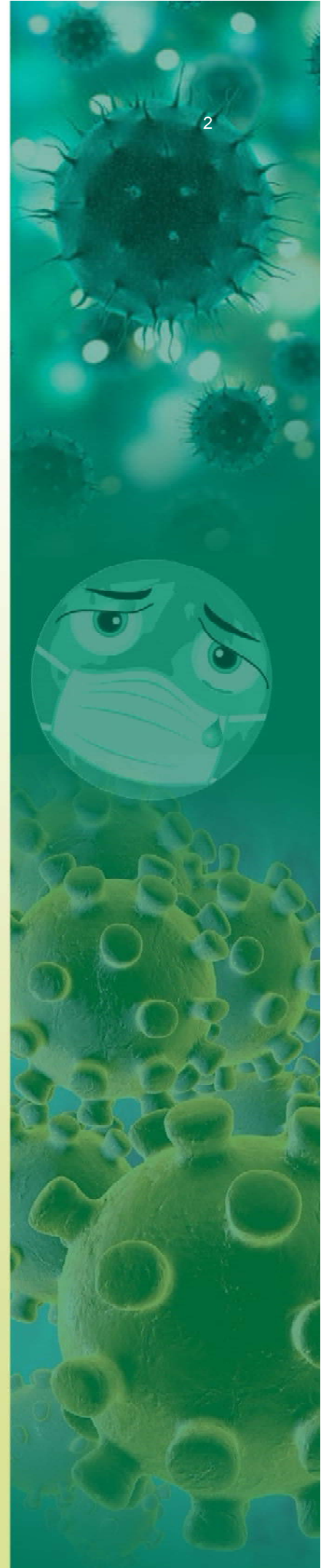

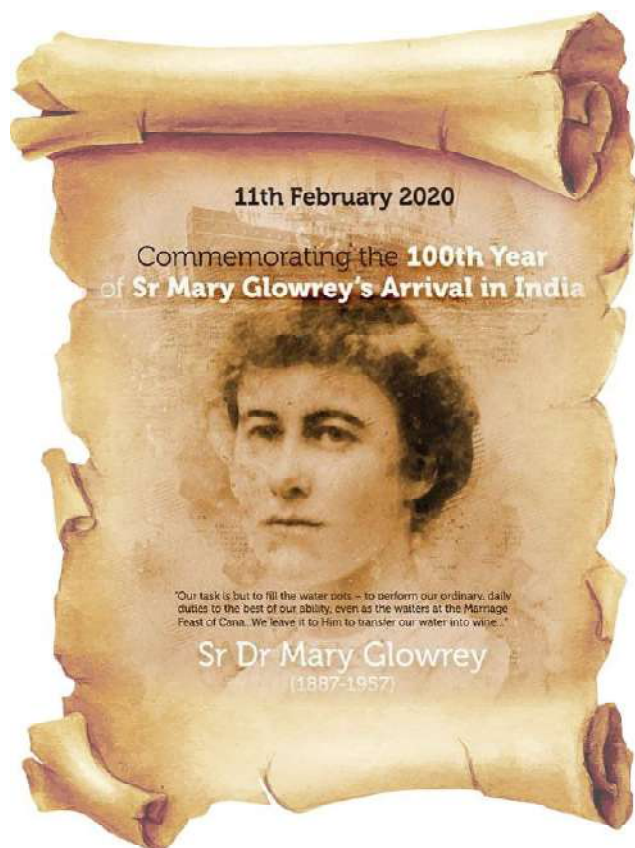

Mary Glowrey

100 Years in India

(1920-2020)



Who was Mary Glowrey?

It's worth reflecting on Mary Glowrey's short biography as we commemorate her centenary presence in Guntur.

Born on 23 June 1887 in Birregurra, Victoria about 135 km west of Melbourne, Mary Glowrey was the third of nine children. She was a "shy, quiet and humble" child. Intelligent and eager to learn, she did well at school and by the time she left her outstanding academic accomplishments had earned her a cash scholarship to begin studying for a Bachelor of Arts at the University of Melbourne. However, after a great deal of prayer and encouragement of her father, Mary

switched to Medicine, an unusual choice for a woman in those days. By 1910, one year after the death of fellow Victorian and religious, St Mary of the Cross MacKillop, she graduated with a Bachelor of Medicine and Surgery.

The next two years were spent in New Zealand where she did her residency. Returning to Melbourne in 1912, Mary Glowrey built a successful private practice with rooms in Collins Street. During this time, she also worked at Victoria's St Vincent's Hospital, where she had gained invaluable clinical experience, as the hospital's "Physician to Outpatients." She would later say: "I can never sufficiently express the gratitude I owe to St Vincent's Hospital." In addition she also worked at Melbourne's Royal Victorian Eye and Ear Hospital.

Mary's religious vocation came in 1915 after attending Mass at St Patrick's Cathedral, when by chance she happened to read a pamphlet about the appalling death rate among young mothers and babies in India, and the urgent need for medical missionaries there. The 28-year-old fell to her knees and knew that God was calling her to a life of medical mission work in India. But with the world in the turmoil of World War I, she had to wait until the global conflict ended before she would be able to travel to India and begin her mission.

"From the Cathedral, I went to my rooms in Collins St," Mary wrote. "On the hall table there was a small pamphlet addressed to me. The pamphlet was about Dr Agnes McLaren, a pioneer Scottish doctor who became a Catholic at 62 and at the age of 72, went to India to establish a hospital for the care of women. It brought me face to face with Christ. My life's work lay clear before me now. It was to be medical mission work in India".

Despite her spiritual humility and natural reserve, the following year Mary was elected founding president of the Catholic Women's League of Victoria and Wagga Wagga in 1916 and led this inspiring group of young Catholic women seeking to change society through prayer as well as action.

During this time, she also studied for a higher medical degree in obstetrics, gynaecology and ophthalmology, and in 1919 graduated as Doctor of Medicine.

Finally, in 1920, the war well over and shipping lanes open once more, 33-year-old Mary sailed for India where she joined the Society of Jesus Mary Joseph in Guntur.

During the years of her religious formation, she has not worked as a doctor but rather, helped in the clinic while studying two new languages: Dutch, the language of the congregation, and Telugu, the local Indian language. Sister Mary Glowrey returned to medical practice after her temporary religious vows. She dedicated her life to care for the sick and bring comfort to the afflicted. She treated countless patients and even those without any means of transport came long distances from the farthest villages to see her.

At first, the sight of the gentle white doctor moving between earthen huts of Guntur must have caught the eyes of everyone. Her face was serene, her eyes focused and her heart moved. That this extraordinary woman leaving her successful practice in Melbourne, arrived in Guntur on 11 Feb, in 1920. She was first nun doctor who had received special permission and blessing of Pope Pius XI, to administer care to the sick and practice obstetrics and gynaecology to save thousands of mothers and babies added further grace to her work.

She worked so tirelessly for 37 years ministering to the spiritual and medical needs of the people of India, particularly the poor laying in the mud huts of interior hamlets of Guntur District. Her love for India, its culture and its people led her to explore traditional Indian medicines and to use these as part of her medical arsenal.

Mary Glowrey JMJ, Servant of God, was the world's first Sister-doctor. She remained close to her family all her life, despite never returning to her homeland. Her mission was "to radiated Christ by word and example."

In 1925, Sister Mary founded St. Joseph's Hospital, Guntur and within a year, records state that there were 90 in patients and 44,180 outpatients - Sister Mary working as the only doctor. When there were no recognised programmes for nurses in India, she initiated training courses and trained herself as alone teacher to midwives, nurses and pharmacists, both nuns and local women, in order to visit villages to extend health care to those who could not travel. Reaching out to the incapacitated poor patients and those suffering from incurable diseases in rural villages by mobile clinics in bullock carts or small motor vehicles was her innovation.

Recognising the need to promote the Catholic Healthcare reach to the poor across all the Indian States, in 1943 in the midst of World War II she founded the Catholic Health Association of India (CHAI) which serves millions of people every year. Several years later a Catholic Medical College was established in Bangalore to train health professionals to provide health care for all as well as to promote



Catholic teachings and protect the sacredness of human life.

Sr. Mary had suffered terribly from cancer in her last few years. Her life filled with an indomitable zeal, unshakable faith and self-surrender, with sincere humility and serene simplicity, was like a holocaust, that led to her intense suffering. She accepted everything as God’s will and suffered willingly and joyfully till her last breath. She left her earthly life on May 5, 1957 with the words, “Jesus Mary Joseph and my Jesus, I love you.”

Today, Sister Mary Glowrey is venerated by many and her legacy continues to bear fruit in India. Her life stands as an icon of extraordinary humility, missionary commitment and zeal. She faced seemingly impossible obstacles, including famine, drought, difficulties caused by World War II, inadequate finances, and impenetrable bureaucracies; Sister Mary always remembered that the work she was undertaking was not only her work, but God’s work.

Walking in her footsteps is truly humbling. Many of us are privileged to live on the same holy ground she lived and served, while some others take a chance to visit and feel her presence. It must be truly an amazing experience and blessing to meet several elderly JMJ sisters who had worked with Dr Sr Mary Glowrey, and cared for her in the final months of her life. Listening to their stories certainly impress and inspire us!

Now it’s our turn to grow in holiness. Let’s pray intensely and honestly for favours and miracles through the intercessory power of Sister Mary Glowrey.

Servant of God Mary Glowrey: Centenary Celebrations of Arrival in India

The 11 Feb, 2020 completes 100 years of providential entrance of a great visionary, zealous missionary and brilliant doctor - Mary Glowrey to our Mother Land India; to Guntur city the pride of modern Andhra Pradesh. Certainly, it was a day of gratitude and joy for every JMJ, as the Congregation observed this distinctive Centenary Celebration of the NUN who revolutionized the Catholic Healthcare in India.

On Friday, the seventh February, 2020 the celestial rays of the dawn welcomed the JMJ family and a many well-wisher as they embarked into the holy ground of St. Joseph's convent, Guntur to participate in this mega event. In the cool breezy twilight, JMJ got ready to rekindle and relive the missionary zeal of Mary Glowrey who set her foot on the Indian soil 100 years ago, to save souls and love the poor with an enthralling motto: '*O Divine Heart, all for You!*'

It was a heart-warming sight to see sisters from four corners of India, religious of different congregations flocking to the venue to witness to the holiness and virtuous life of Servant of God. The ceremony of the long-awaited day began with ecclesiastical blessing of the refurbished Mary Glowrey's museum decked by requiem relics of Sr. Mary of the Sacred Heart JMJ by the Bishop of Vijayawada Rev. Dr. Joseph Raja Rao, and the Provincial Superiors of the four Indian JMJ Provinces namely Sr. Anthony Mary Dasari, Sr. Tresa Kandlakunta, Sr. Mukta Xess and Sr. Marykutty Antony Pottananiyil inaugurated the museum. The updated museum with additional portraits of the Servant of God is very impressive and a feast to the eyes!



This was followed by the ceremonial procession of 100 people symbolically marking the event led by the melodic band, marched forward to the stage. The climax of this significant occasion was the commemorative thanksgiving Eucharistic celebration presided over by the Bishop of Guntur Rev. Dr. Bhagaiah Chinnabathini, Apostolic Administrator of Kadapa diocese & Bishop Emeritus of Guntur Rev. Dr. Gali Bali, and Bishop of Vijayawada Rev. Dr. Joseph Raja Rao Thelagathoti, and several other Priests.

During the introductory address Sr. Tresa Kandlakunta, the Provincial Superior of Guntur Province applauded the relentless service and dedication of Sr. Dr. Mary Glowrey to the poorest of the poor. She acknowledged that Sr. Mary of the Sacred Heart JMJ was a pioneering visionary in Healthcare Ministry especially when Guntur was reeling under abject poverty and underdeveloped in many ways. She further noted that even today her miraculous touch is being felt by many as the Servant of God continues to intercede for the people of Guntur.

The chief celebrant heaped praises and paid rich tributes to the Servant of God and said, Mary Glowrey was an epitome of goodness and holiness, sacrificing a bright career she willing stooped down to win souls for Jesus. She loved the poor and by doing so, she became a sacrificial Pascal Lamb. He exhorted all the religious to imbibe her spirit in service to the poor and walk in her footsteps to give Jesus to all. The choir added solemnity to the celebration with its soul stirring songs at the Eucharistic thanksgiving.

A special Centenary Concert featuring a dance-drama ballet 'Glowrey Smruthilayalu' (*Glowrey's memorable moments*) was staged by students from JMJ Schools and College of Nursing highlighting the biopic of Mary Glowrey. It was a beautiful performance, very emotional, moving and inspiring awe-struck one and all. All dances and actors were highly praised for putting your heart and soul into expression.

The former Provincial Superiors were felicitated on this occasion. A fellowship banquet was spread for all at the end of the programme. Participants left the campus with the spirit of a goodhearted missionary, a Saint to become!

What was a part of my childhood dream, that I now recognize as a privileged experience! Born in a peasant family, my childhood was enjoyable, mostly complacent and relatively solitary. It was between 1970 – 1980, as a youngster, I used to go along with St. Ann sisters in my village Dachepalle of Guntur district in Andhra Pradesh, to nearby hamlets distributing simple medications to those under privileged villagers to alleviate their pain and suffering.



These gestures of compassion and acts of mercy to the downtrodden poor rural folks and at the small health center along with the pastoral visits inspired me subsequently to embrace religious life to imitate Jesus Christ in healing ministry especially to the most disadvantaged rural poor who cannot afford to come to the main health centers. My Aunt Sr. Fatima Katakam was influential to join in JMJ.

God's personalized first gift to me is my life and second my vocation to consecrated life. As I nurture my vocation to be a faithful JMJ Sister, I fondly remember how deeply the life of our beloved founder Fr. M. Wolff impressed me during my formative years and even now his sayings resonate strongly - *"I like to work like a Giant"* and *"I want to gain as many souls as I can."*

Looking back to those blessed student days, I deem it as a privilege to serve as first General Surgeon among JMJ Doctor sisters being inspired by the Motto: "You shall live because of Me".

Ever since I became a full pledged doctor and later a General Surgeon, my childhood dream to serve the rural poor patients became real as I worked at JMJ hospitals - JMJ Health Center, Sivadi, OLF Hospital, Porumamilla and St. Joseph's Hospital, Nellore.

To be a good doctor is to stand out from the crowd and let patients know that I care about them. In healthcare where everything is digital, I always tried to keep that human touch with my patients. Yes, human experience at the forefront of my care keeps elevating my resilience, brings well-being to my patients and joy to me. Spending life in the service of rural people creates memorable experiences. At no time I have regretted for not being in the big cities, but rather overwhelmed and satisfied to reach out to the poor, extending the mercy and healing touch of Jesus, bringing joy and solace to thousands of rural folks.

From OLF Hospital we conduct health camps reaching out to the village centers catering best possible professional healthcare. These health camps include basic blood tests and ultrasonogram when essential and prescription of medication besides educating and counseling people regarding hygiene, balanced diet, exercise and healthy life style modifications. This approach is highly beneficial to the poor, reducing their expenditure, travel burden and timely treatment of illness. Even some of them are referred to higher centers for further management depending upon the nature and severity of their diseases.

Being a Nun, a Doctor, a Surgeon and a Friend to so many of patients is a blessing of God! I wonder at my patients' trust and confidence, who come for treatment travelling long distances from different districts, States and few even from overseas. My taste for the Divine, is born from the seed of faith planted in me by my dear parents and the full support I receive from JMJ Congregation throughout my journey as a JMJ Sister. I am truly grateful to God! Yes, I enjoy my vocation as a precious gift, a call to happiness through mission as a Sister Doctor in a specially designed structure to

work like a giant, never tired of doing God's work, in spite of risking, facing and challenging many hurdles as I trek forward.

My passion to learn more and more, helped me to gain expertise in Laparoscopic procedures, which facilitated to do minimally invasive Surgeries even in the Rural Hospital like OLF Hospital, Porumamilla against all odds, with dare minimum facilities with no assistants. I thank God for Anesthetists from other districts who are available once in a fortnight for planned laparoscopic surgeries by pooling patients up to 10-15 in a group. Being a General Surgeon, I have taken time and effort to study and qualify in PG. Diploma in Diabetology, PG Diploma in Ultrasonogram and also Fellowship in Minimal Access Surgeries (FMAS – Laparoscopy) which are very useful and great help in treating patients, lest they have to travel more than 100 Km for the medical/surgical help.

I love our beloved Servant of God - Mary Glowrey for her indomitable spirit and great role model who embraced multiple tasks as doctor, teacher, midwife, pharmacist and a reformer of Catholic Healthcare in India, above all as a perfect JMJ NUN! The secret of my multitasking spirit is from the ever-burning zeal to learn continually like doctor Mary Glowrey and to work hard inflaming God's love and mercy in my little ways. Finally, I thank God Almighty for being with me and leading me forward. I am ever grateful to the Congregation and all the Sisters who moulded me from '*an ill shaped wood to a master piece*' - a Lilly Flower in the garden of JMJ!



Skilling Youth at HOLY FAMILY SKILL DEVELOPMENT CENTRE SATHENAPALLI

In today's digital world, signs of global change are rapid and constant. They seem to travel at the *speed of light*. On the other hand, the pace at which we help our students craft their own unique skills travel at the *speed of life* — one successful batch at a time!

How can our JMJ ministry find on-going relevance in this ever-changing, fast paced world? We have a best example from Sattenapalli. Our Province Leaders being open to changing needs, adapted our ministry to the changing times. Established in 1952, Holy Family Convent and Hospital was the fifth one among JMJ institutes in India. When the hospital became non-functional, JMJ Guntur Province has opened scope to convert the Hospital into Holy Family School in 1986. The famous Holy Family TB Sanatorium of yesteryears, which gave life to thousands of TB patients, was changed into Community Care Centre serving HIV/AIDS affected people from 2009 to 2017. From 2018 it is shaped into Holy Family Skill Development Centre (HFSDC) under the umbrella of JMJ Social Service Society, Nallapadu and has become part of Skilling India.



The far-sighted vision of the pioneers, their progressive and purposeful engagement in different ministries through compassionate and empathic action continues to enliven the lives of today's youth. Ultimately, this successful skills development ministry, emulated by our Sisters, expresses the nature and purpose of our Charism in the service of youth providing them a promising future. We collaborate with the schemes from the Government: Andhra Pradesh State Skill Development Corporation (APSSDC) and Non-Government: Life Circle Senior Services, Telangana. The skill development program offers skill training to school dropouts, young at risk, unemployed youth, to develop their skills and help them stand by themselves in the society. HFSDC stands like light house in Andhra Pradesh, offering practical training to 30 students in General Duty Assistant (GDA) and Home Nursing courses at St. Joseph's Hospital Guntur, Govt. PHC at Muppalla. Certification is accorded by Andhra Pradesh State Skill Development Corporation (APSSDC). During the last two years we have trained a total of 200 students, placed them all in good Jobs.

I am grateful to God and the Congregation of JMJ for consenting me to be a tutor for skill development course at Holy Family. I feel blessed and privileged to skilling the youth particularly in-Home Nursing, which has a great demand in geriatric care and care of terminally ill clients. Glory to God and thanks to all who helped me serve the underprivileged youth.

The seed of my vocation to religious life was planted by the sisters during my school years at St. Mary's High School in Palai. Fr. Thomas Kattakayan, my uncle priest was instrumental to walk in the silent footsteps of Jesus Christ as a JMJ candidate on 27 July 1960.

Sr. Josepha Rachamalla, my novice mistress instilled in me a desire to love Christ, the anchor of my life. With this spirit, I made my first commitment to God in JMJ on 28 January, 1963 and eventually my final profession on 29 January, 1968. In our days, we do everything that is charged with in the community with greatest possible love. My companions would remark that superiors often say to other young sisters “look at Rosilda and learn what is obedience.”



In Fr. Wolff's Pious maxims— *‘Jesus says that those who seek the kingdom of God will get everything else as bonus! How then could those who desire nothing in this world than the kingdom of God be lacking in anything? Now then, that is what we as sisters of JMJ have to do’* (PM 32). This message has greatly impressed me to live authentic life as a sister and I hope this will surely impress you too. I am truly grateful to God that my cousin Sr. Ligori and her niece Sr. Jomsy too joined our Congregation after me.

All through my life in JMJ, I always tried to be obedient to go where I was sent without a second word. I have worked in Guntur as a librarian and at St. Stanislaus Convent, Bangalore as kitchen in-charge. Although not a nurse, I was able to serve Sr. Sebastian nearly two years as she was confined to bed. I worked also for few years in Leprosy Sanatorium at Summana Halli. I have passion for nature, and enjoy conversing with every plant, being in charge of garden at JMJ Provincialate for many years. I love observing the tiny seedlings growing, flowering and every grass dancing at rain falls.

As a cheer gift of life, I wish to be always busy with some work or the other. I used to spend my leisure time painting altar boarders and table cloths, and taking contemplative walks around the garden. For when I stand before God at the end of my life, I must be able to answer him, that no single talent of mine left without using, everything for God's glory.

“Pray without ceasing” (I Th 5:17) is my watch word. ‘You are silent and contemplative; You speak less and smile always’ - sisters in my community remark often. When they make queries about my praying the Way of the Cross daily, I reply “I am doing PhD” (preparing for happy death). Community life is a boost for my religious life; I respect and enjoy with everyone young and old. Being thankful for every little favour I receive from others; I repeat the common phrase of two words – *Thank You!* As I am advancing in age and retired from active life my only prayer and aspiration is “to reach heaven - my home forever” with purity of body, mind and soul.

The word 'zeal' means 'great passion, energy or enthusiasm in pursuit of a cause'. We learn from our Founder – an intense apostolic zeal he demonstrated all through his life. "It is fine to be zealous, provided the purpose is good, and to be so always." ([Gal. 4:18](#)).

Yes, apostolic zeal for the Lord is the hall mark of my life in our Congregation for over 75 years. *I can't believe - so many years!!* With deep gratitude to God for this gifted life in the service of the Lord, my memory flashes through my vocation and life as JMJ sister. As a young girl, while studying at Madras, I encountered many sisters, but on one occasion, I was wonderstruck – what courage these sisters needed to leave everything to follow Christ? At that tender age, I was impressed by their life and works of charity; felt for the first time – God's gentle voice in my heart.

After completing 10th class, I expressed desire to my mother. I was only daughter to my parents and I had a brother who was not so well. None of my family members appreciated my decision, including my religious aunt. My parents wanted me to get married in which I was least interested. I asked my mother, "mother, in whose hands is my future? In God's hands or your hands?" My mother was astonished at my words! Ever since she encouraged me, but my father kept silence and went through deep sorrow at my decision.

My deepest desire fulfilled: Sometimes God guides to us through others. While I was discerning my vocation, late Bishop Mummadi Ignatius and Fr. Singareddy Thomas guided me to join the Society of JMJ. During my religious formation I gained insight into the unique aspects of community life and mission filled with apostolic zeal.

Peace like no other: Our Founder a follower of Saint Ignatius, taught us what is there in *Spiritual Exercises* that "when your own will is aligned with God's will, you shall experience great consolation. My surrender to God's will enabled me to know God more and love him intimately. As a young woman called to live consecrated life, I felt profound peace within me, a peace like no other or, as Jesus says, "a peace the world cannot give" (John 14:27).

Life well lived in JMJ: Being true to self, I tried to live by word and deed, the charism and spirit of the Society. I was fortunate to work as a teacher, formator, community animator, social worker and evangeliser. God in all His mercy, chose me an unworthy person to lead the first Indian Province. Accepting this weighty task as first native JMJ sister, as first provincial superior was a privilege to serve my sisters at the same time a challenging one. I left this choice to Christ - "*it was not you who chose me, but I who chose you*" (John 15:16). It was God's will and choice and I accepted it in faith. I tried my very best using all my strength and talent along with a team of councillors towards expansion of the congregation and relevance of our ministries in social service and evangelization.

My love and option to serve the poor: Always I remember my mother telling me about the poor, and to stand by the poor. As a sister called to serve the poor, I sought God's will saying my own "fiat" like our

Blessed Mother “let it be done” and I could feel very time a palpable joy that emanated within my heart! As provincial of first Indian province I tried to keep align with the general chapter and provincial chapter decisions – perusing all our efforts to be in solidarity and with preferential option for the poor. After my term in leadership role, I continued to be at the serve of the poor in Kondramulta and Durgi. Working for and among the people affected by leprosy was most satisfying years of my life in JMJ. I loved being an evangelizer proclaiming the kingdom of God among the poor.

To my beloved Congregation: All the sisters must be good; an example to others. Live a sacrificial life. I had many temptations, but I tell myself every time loudly that there is no greater love than to do the Will of God and Serve Him alone! The prophetic mission of Christ who was “sent to preach good news to the poor” (Lk 4:18), should find a strong resonance in today’s JMJ Sisters and in the Congregation. To accomplish this mission, our Congregation must search out the signs of the times and interpret them in the light of the Gospel, thus responding to the persistent human suffering in different forms and care for God’s creation.

My humble appeal to young generation:

God told Jeremiah, “Before I formed you in the womb, I knew you, before you were born, I set you apart . . . (Jeremiah 1:5). So also, you are called by God because He loved you before you were born. Be blessed and fortunate to be a sister of JMJ and to serve the Lord faithfully.

Do you have a great energy and enthusiasm for the life in Christ being made manifest in serving others? Or has your zeal been dimmed... by time, or trials, or the busy pace of life? Do you have a fire of the Holy Spirit in your soul!

I appeal to you dear sisters to stand firmly in God, practicing these *Four Pillars* of JMJ life...

My Vocation - a call within a call

We, the consecrated women being blessed a hundred-fold, by no merits of ours, but merely due to the benevolence of our God, should be able to attract the youth to our way of life. A bird's eye view of the present-day situation in the world reveals the fact that "the harvest indeed is great, but the labourers are few; let us pray therefore to the Lord of the harvest to send more labourers" (Mt 9:37-38).

The Lord in His goodness has sowed the seed of vocation to religious life in my heart at a very tender age. My mother, a regular church goer, whom I accompanied always, was my inspiration, and her prayerful life was a model set before me. My schooling with Carmelite Sisters also helped me to nourish my vocation. Besides, I had the habit of reading some missionary magazines like 'preshitha keralam' in which I read stories about missionary works of priests and nuns.

My first Call to JMJ: My maternal uncle who was a missionary priest in Andhra Pradesh inspired us about his missionary works in interior villages. Desiring to be a missionary, I decided to join the Society of JMJ

in 1957. My initial formation under the gifted and affectionate guidance of Sr. Algondis of fond memories helped to deepen my spiritual life and practice virtues of humility and simplicity.

In 1960, I made my first profession – being convinced of my call to become "*alter Christe*" the other Christ. Then as a junior sister I was transferred to St. Joseph's Convent, Guntur to pursue my collegiate education in government Women's College, Guntur. Here, I observed JMJ sisters and other staff nurses always busy caring for patients. These sights slowly developed in me a great desire to commit myself helping the poor and suffering patients.

My second Call to Nursing: This was the time of starting a catholic medical college in India, the brainchild of Dr. Sr. Mary Glowrey was taking shape. Thus, St. Johns Medical College, Bangalore was started in 1960 and applications were invited for recruiting medical students and from JMJ Society five of us were sent to appear for this entrance examination. But only Sr. Lillian got selected and all others were rejected. Sr. Jerome and self were asked to pursue B.Sc. (Hons) nursing course at R.A.K College of Nursing, New Delhi as this was the first and best nursing colleges in the country at that time. Thus, my second call to become a professional nurse was realised.

When I returned from Delhi after my graduation and post graduation in nursing, as principal of St. Joseph's School of Nursing, Guntur I had great opportunities of being the president of Trained Nurses Association of India (TNAI) A.P branch and associated with Catholic Nurses guild of India. God, in His mercy has selected




me to initiate Nursing courses - GNM, B.Sc., and M.Sc., at St. Theresa's, Hyderabad. In this second call as a professional nurse and nurse educator for 37 years, I am happy that I could offer yeoman service of training hundreds of young bands of nurses to serve humanity across the globe. My only wish is that the JMJ brand of nurses should be recognised by the patients and general public for their committed services.


My great ambition as a Nurse Educator was to raise the standards of nursing in India. All the nursing leaders in the country unitedly represented this matter to the Indian Nursing Council to stop the existing diploma nursing programme in a phased manner and regularization of B.Sc. Nursing in the country as per the international standards. This indeed was considered as a great achievement for the nursing profession in the country from 2021. I thank God for making our efforts yield fruit for the benefit of nursing profession.


My third Call a graceful retired life: With immense gratitude to the Almighty, I now acknowledge my third call to live a graceful retired life in our home JMJ Shanthinilayam. Out of the twenty-two sisters living here, eight sisters are involved in active apostolate, while fourteen of us are called to live witnessing our religious values - life of prayer, life of love and concern for others and sharing our life experiences in the community. Thus, we try to make the remaining part of our life joyful and expressive for each other, as we are waiting for the final call to reach our eternal home.

May I now request the prayerful support of all our dear sisters who are reading this article, so that we can respond to this final call joyfully and reach our final destination in total surrender.

It was March 26th Holy Week Monday 2018. I was heading toward Bharathiar University in Coimbatore, Tamil Nadu to submit my PhD thesis. All of a sudden, while still travelling by train, I experienced severe headache and vomiting. On reaching Coimbatore, I managed to see a doctor in a clinic, who offered me symptomatic relief. In three days, I was able to get back to near normalcy. Then I proceeded to the university to complete the obligations of the presentation of my thesis. I was in a fix and swamped, barely had time to breathe. Using sandwich technique, I submitted my thesis.

On my return journey I was very sluggish and somehow, I reached Bangalore to St. Philomena’s Hospital almost dragging my feet. On examining me in emergency department, Doctors exclaimed that reaching the hospital in that critical condition itself was a great miracle! Immediately the treatment followed. I was admitted on Holy Saturday in MICU - the road less travelled. The scan reports revealed that I was suffering from brain aneurysm. It was Easter vigil; mid-night, in an obscure place, I could hear the

Church bells and melodies of *Alleluia*. With severe headache I was combating with Risen Lord to heal me. As I surrendered to the Lord. I found some relief and relaxation.

The following day was the silver jubilee celebration of my batch sisters at JMJ Provincialate, Bangalore. With profound gratitude, I celebrated my silver jubilee in MICU, exchanged my silver ring with the *Risen Lord*, experiencing rebirth as an *Easter Silver Bride!* It was an impeccable moment in my life, witnessed by my JMJ family and my siblings. UISG FORMATION PROGRAMME:

In response to the need to prepare sisters for formation ministry, the International Union of Superiors General (UISG) offers a programme in English for sisters taking up the responsibility of accompanying those in the initial stages of formation to religious life. This programme is offered in the context of the religious congregations of the participants and the needs of the church and the world in the 21st century.

I am grateful to General Council and Provincial Council of Guntur Province for providing me the opportunity to participate in the Formation course, at Rome for five months (February – June 2020). From 29th January 2020, the formation course began with orientation and Inaugural mass. We were 44 participants belonging to 33 Congregations and from 26 countries. We were happy to introduce ourselves to each other and tried to mingle with everyone each day. The orientation classes at the beginning of the course helped me to get know my classmates and to locate myself as to where I am and where I must be heading towards. We went to UISG institute for the sessions for one month and continued through course online due to corona pandemic.

Topics covered include: • Processes of human and spiritual growth • Intercultural living • Vocation and the consecrated life • Spirituality • Prayer, community, ministry as dimensions of consecrated life • The vows • Discernment • Mission in the context of the world today • Stages of formation and their processes. During the programme, the participants form a learning and supportive community, take on leadership responsibilities and share the uniqueness of their charisms and cultures.

All the participants had on-going accompaniment and an eight day Directed Retreat. In a very special way, sessions on prayer, human sexuality and my autobiography helped me to go deeper into myself. Group members' sharing and resource persons guidance challenged, inspired and motivated me to go deeper into myself; discovering myself; knowing my weaknesses and vulnerabilities. This helped me to have a greater integration of my strengths and weaknesses, and to understand, respect and accept others as they are and to be compassionate with myself and others.





From my integration of the course I am inspired by the following:

- = Let go and Let the new come in; I am not leader but collaborator.
- = Observe - Reflect - Act - don't jump into conclusions (nonjudgmental attitude towards self and others).
- = Qualitative presence to each formee/community member – quality of my presence is remembered for ever than the quantity of my presence.
- = Teaching in initial formation on non-negotiable aspects, policy and ministry of the congregation can help the formees to discern their vocation.
- = My response to others from a tiny mustard seed – a kind word, a listening heart, a healing glance and a compassionate presence.
- = Formee needs to “make progress” with the help of her formator. Formation is gradual including the formation of Jesus (30 years) – be patient.
- = Each day is new day as well as the person. Don't bring the past. Live in present. Don't ask “why”. It obstructs the person to speak and doesn't help growth.
- = Prayer doesn't change the reality but it changes me. Mystical moments are to be enjoyed and not explored.
- = The four signs of prayerful person are gratitude/praise, sense of wonder, sense of family and playfulness.
- = To know the feelings of Jesus, Pray Psalms meaningfully because Jesus prayed those psalms.
- = Mother Mary treasured all these things in her heart, pondered, meditated and cherished. These things include joy, hope, trust, beautiful things, sadness, anguish, anxiety, sickness, crisis, misfortune, desire for revenge, apprehension and so on... Teach novices to pray everything as mother Mary prayed specifically and concretely.
- = Conversation with founder and requesting his wisdom to guide me as the formator of his congregation was a heart touching experience and the realization of founder's will as a novice director. It was an affirming and strengthening experience.
- = To be aware that as a formator my self-esteem fluctuates/spiral and not straight line.
- = The process of formation is not a straight-line arrow but it has different spirals of growth as human persons formed by us are unique and the level of growth differs. It is gradual and slow process.

I am extremely happy that “Formation Course” has helped me to live my life better and help others. It is a great, long lasting and unforgettable experience for me.

God's Eternal Plan in *My Life*

As I sat reflecting on the eternal plan of God in my life, I realized God's mighty hand and generosity in blessing me richly with the vocation to the Congregation of JMJ. It is incomprehensible to put into words my experience of God. At this moment my heart overwhelms with joy and gratitude for His amazing works in my life. Here goes my vocation story

Not too long ago, we had conversations, back and forth, with my colleagues about our own life back home. It used to be a reflection, a sharing, thought over experience and a self examination of how we have come to this present status anyway.

When I think of today, it's more than three years gone by in my sisterhood after professing my vows for the first time in JMJ, a Congregation that is of great influence in my life. Like many of us, I am also from an ordinary family, well founded in faith, siblings of four, with two boys and two girls. My parents are simple in life style but very prayerful and firm in their Catholic devotions. They always had a soft corner for me, their youngest child with slightly poor physical health. As a year-old child, I had to be seriously attended to, because I was paralyzed and was not able to move at all. It was so detrimental and serious that everyone started praying for my survival. My mother persistently took me to a Charismatic Centre many a time confiding in God's healing power and offered me to His Providence.

Every time she applied and massaged my paralyzed limbs with the Blessed Oil that she received from that shrine, she cried with running tears for a miraculous healing. Indeed, the great cure happened in my limbs with a gradual improvement in the movements of my legs and hands, and I was able to get up, stand and walk all by myself leading to a complete recovery.

At this juncture as a token of gratitude there raised a spontaneous response from my parents to offer this miraculously cured child to God Himself, but I was too young for this at that stage.

In such a back ground of poor economic conditions and the long distance to walk to my school I had to cope up with my studies and also the demands of family. Somehow, I was able to continue my studies till Intermediate. In all these there was a feeling that something of divine power was over me leading me at all the turning points of my life. I was not that concerned or matured enough to think of my next stage of life after my schooling. Then God sent me an agent, to inspire, in the person of a dedicated priest Fr. Nirmal SVD, an extraordinarily inspired priest who guided me to discern my vocation.

As it happens in every one's encounter of life, my mother had a twist of proposal to venture for a job and settle in life like all my school friends. My heart was throbbing and mind puzzled, I felt that I am at the cross roads, but my prayers and reflections in the presence of God enlightened me to interrogate with my mother, "While God has given you many children why can't you spare one for His service when the child is really yearning for it". My mother became speechless and offered me to God, respecting my decision.

There you are, with my real story as I am so very happy enjoying my daily routines as a nun in JMJ. Involvement and enthusiasm in what I do and live are my gifts. The spirituality that I learnt and experience are the ones I relish in my community, for that matter, basically, my Congregation is breath and life for me. All that I have, my being, what I do and serve, what I profess are from my community, the Congregation and people at large. I do enjoy and cherish living JMJ charism **'Ever Adaptable Apostolic Availability.'**

Our Lady of Providence Girls Senior High School, a Government assisted institute was established in 1989 by the late Bishop James Kwadwo Owusu, with the assistance of American sisters of Divine Providence. The School was handover to JMJ management in 2000.

Under the guidance of Congregation of JMJ, and excellent management of the sisters for the past two decades, OLP has been committed to holistic education of young girls in all domains, as emphasized by the Founder Rev. Fr. Mathias Wolff on Education of Girls.

Government policy has been adhered to in admissions. Students are able to do well with good grades at the end of their various courses. OLP is synonymous with discipline, which is a hallmark of our academic excellence.

Initially, in spite of the enviable achievements, it is worthy to note that the school was in a deplorable state and was not attractive enough to retain teachers and students. However, under the committed hard work of JMJ sisters and the faculty, the Local and Central Governments have begun to take interest in the infrastructural development of the school. We have enormous contribution from Parents' Teachers Association (PTA). They built ICT Laboratory, Library, Science Laboratory with hall; sick bay and multi-purpose hall which are under construction.

Looking back at the inception of the school with a handful of students, staff and resources, the school can now boast of 1000 students, adequate number of staff, many structures and billions Cedis worth of equipment's for science laboratories. In order to make the school more conducive for academic work, the iconic structures such as 12-unit story classroom building, Science Laboratory, modern Administration block, 1000 capacity three story dormitory block, Kitchen and Dining Hall Complex have beautified the shape of the school in all angles. These are the requisite ingredients for holistic education including sound moral and conscience formation.



Often time, when we look at the past, we remember it with mixed feelings but the achievements in these last two decades have given us hope to believe that the future is bright. We are proud to say that our sisters beginning from Sr. Rosy Kolattukudy, Sr. Regina Zangiti, Sr. Anthonamma Polavarapu, Sr. Showrilu Allam and many other sisters together with their staff and students have contributed immensely to the middle-class manpower development of Ghana over the period under review. The School has recorded a number of achievements: Notable among these are the following:



Increase in students and staff population from 40 to 1000 and 8 to 93 respectively. We always have 100% results in final examinations. Best four students were sent to India for free Degree education through our Indian Ambassador to Ghana. We won the best disciplined grade "A" school in the country.

We profusely thank GOD for His countless blessings on our OLP School which stood the test of times through its daring vision, deep commitment and sacrificial life of leadership of JMJ sisters to achieve its supreme purpose of empowering the Girl Children through education ministry.

9. Avoiding throw away culture during gatherings and travels and promoting safe waste
10. disposal practices.

Creation is a gift, it is a wonderful gift that God has given us, so that we care for it and we use it for the benefit of all, always with great respect and gratitude. Pope Francis said: we destroy creation, Creation will destroy us! Never forget this! 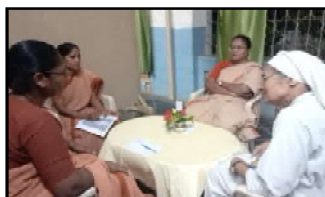


Day 7 : 22nd May 2020 – “Carbon Footprint & Divine Mercy Reflections”

People around the world are practicing social distancing and staying in their homes. This has not only helped to decrease the spread of this pandemic but it is also helping mother earth to heal. Despite the panic and human loss, earth is healing.

Yes, Earth is healing, Earth is becoming cleaner. This phenomenal change has occurred visibly during the LaudatoSi week celebration from 16-24 May 2020. What a co-incidence! This was a special week and fifth anniversary of Pope Francis' Encyclical 'Laudato Si': On the Care for Our Common Home'. In these times of the pandemic, in which we are more aware of the importance of care for our common home, I hope that our common reflection and commitment helps us to create and strengthen constructive attitudes for the care of creation.

Initially, the pandemic shook me desperately. I was in a state of confusion, fear and anxiety. I am grateful to the Catholic Church at local and global level for virtual daily Eucharist, other spiritual devotions live and/or via YouTube kept us going and living our faith during this crisis period. Amidst such uncertainty, I proclaimed: *Be my rock of refuge, my stronghold to give me safety; for you are my rock and fortress (Ps 71:3)*. Each time we were on the streets to distribute food/provisions to the homeless, migrants, slum dwellers, construction workers and destitute, providing masks, medical assistance... I was wonder struck to see ordinary

people reaching out to the hungry with food and care. In the midst of all this suffering: of illness, hunger and fear- there are also several positive stories that have emerged: of hope and resilience, of courage and selflessness, of availability and generosity, of sacrifice and kindness and much more.

COVID-19 has definitely changed us – we spent more time in prayer, reflection and some even participated in online retreats and prayers. Other positive change is that we have tried to live together and relate to one another more deeply, although it has been extremely hard for some. In the long run, however, I am confident that we become strong in our spirit of solidarity by holding one another in circles of kindness, across all our differences, by standing with one another and caring for one another.

I recall two unexpected incidents during COVID 19 lock down – Sr. Eliza Nallabai a temporarily professed sister, lost her father during the lockdown. It was a shocking news for her as well as for us. We found it very difficult to comfort and were unable to send her for funeral. I appreciate the community who took personal care for her, comforting and consoling her during this grieving period. The second incident is about Dr. Sr. Tresa Terence working at St. John's medical college hospital, in COVID isolation ward, suffered with high temperature and throat infection. We were very scary and anxious - what would be her diagnosis. Miraculously she was negative for corona virus. We thanked God for answering our prayer.

I conclude with the words of Pope Francis: "It is a difficult time for everyone. Let us try, if we can, make the best use of this time: let us be generous, let us help those in need in our neighbourhood, let us look out for the loneliest people, perhaps by telephone or social networks, let us pray to the Lord for those who are in difficulty..."

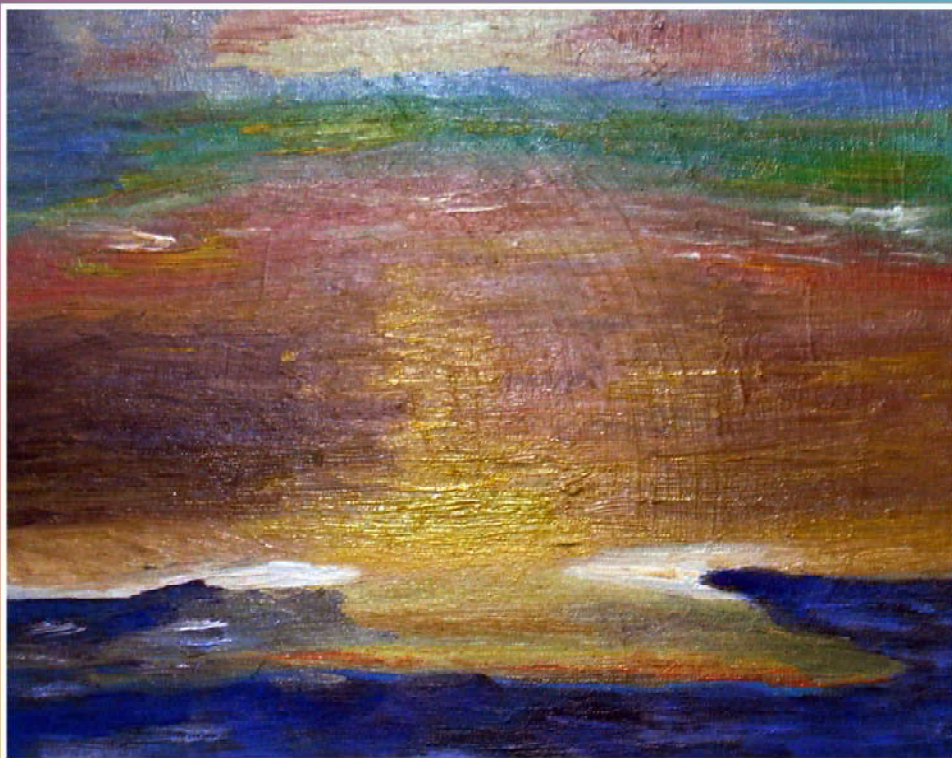

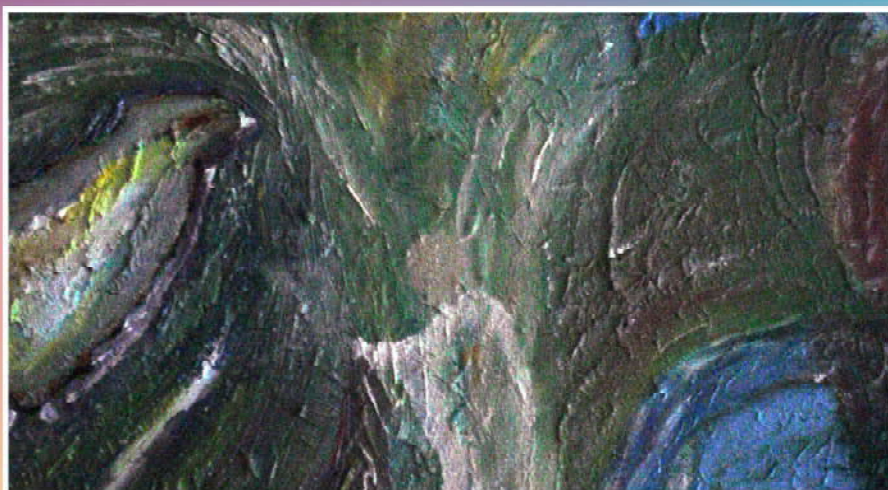

Ranchi Province, narrating – “there are 30 to 35 migrants from Bihar and Odisha working in one of the companies at Hyderabad. Due to COVID 19 the company is closed down and owner gone away without paying their salaries. Father gave me a contact number. Immediately, I made a call, a person responded – “*Sister, we have nothing to eat, we are hungry please help us.*” In two hours, we reached the place with food ready to consume also some cash for their journey home. With tears of joy they wished us with folded hands saying – *Jai Yesu Sisters*. The same day they travelled by a truck to reach their places. Yes, this tiny Corona gave us an opportunity to do a little charity that made a big difference to the migrants. I appreciate and thank all our sisters who generously and enthusiastically came forward to serve our needy brethren.

The death of thousands of people all over the world, deprived of a regular funeral in the presence of loved ones, miseries of millions of migrant workers across India, their death on the roads by accident and starvation, other emerging problems and financial implications have shaken all of us. JMJ Hyderabad Province has been at the side of those whose resources have waned and the needs increased because of COVID 19 lockdown. Many of them are slum dwellers, daily wage migrants, vendors, truck drivers, stone cutters, sanitary and municipality workers who have missed their meagre income during the lockdown and daily survival was a crisis for them. All our communities launched into action with much love with distribution of food grains and essentials to help these deprived families during this lockdown period.



All the members in the Province experienced spiritual renewal through personal, and communal prayers, online retreats and devotions. Apart from all these spiritual exercises all the sisters in the Province have contributed generously an amount from their personal budget for the cause of the deprived. I appreciate and thank each member in the Province for this loving gesture.

This is humanity's wakeup call to the truth of our inter-connections with one another on this earth. Despite the trauma all around us, all of us could embrace this moment as an opportunity to move forward, to create a better world for all, in ways unique to each community. May God bless us for the glory of His name!

Pandemic : Its impact

On 16th March 2020 lockdown was announced by the President of Ghana, asking to close down the schools and churches and cancel funerals and public gatherings. In the beginning it caused a lot of fear and anxiety when we saw the daily news with increased number of positive cases, critical cases and deaths.

We intensified our prayer; spent extra time before the Lord praying for the whole world. It was a blessing in disguise; during this lockdown we had daily Holy Mass in our convent chapel. The priest offered the Holy Mass for various intentions and for the whole world – praying for God’s intervention to bring to an end to this pandemic.

In the beginning our JMJ Mathias Hospital, Yeji had lot of restrictions to take only emergency cases. No one was allowed to come to inside the hospital without following the formalities - mask wearing, hand washing etc. As the days went by, we began normal life with all safety measures. Sisters in health care ministry were as usual busy in their ministry.

Our General Council Sr. Mary and Sr. Valsa had to stay back in Ghana due to the cancellation of all international flights. Five months is a long period of waiting but never losing faith and hope. One good thing is that we were kept busy in the Region as Sr. Valsa and Sr. Mary helped us to update all our documents, finance management and formation.

Ghana COVID - 19 situation in Schools:

Negative impact of COVID - 19: Schools closure influenced not only students, teachers and families but also the management with economic and societal consequences. Initially for few days we had time for prayer, reflection and relaxation, but as the lock downs extended, we felt sometimes lifeless looking at the campus like a desert, without a movement and life. As we heard the news about the reopening of schools from 22nd of June 2020 from Ghana Education service, it has created in us an anxiety of the pandemic

implications. The care free movement of public here make us to feel nonexistence of COVID-19. But in reality, we are threatened with the increase of COVID-19 cases in Ghana.

Positive impact of COVID -19: On the other point of view community time table is reorganized. We could find more quality time to spend with the Lord. Reading Bible and spiritual books, attended online retreat, faith and vocation sharing, familiarizing our credentials of life with one another. Silence and solitude experience helped us to gain greater spiritual strength. It created more time for community activities, exchanges of more innovative ideas, and interior reflection on focused life for different outlook of our religious life.

Laudato Si: This created an occasion to live the spirit of Laudato Si. All the sisters were engaged in activities such as weeding, plantation of fruit and vegetable saplings, trimming of plants, fencing the garden, cleaning the house and campus and fumigation of whole campus buildings, and beautifying the place with ornamental plants.

The Psalmist says, “be still and know that I am God.” In silence, calming and centering our spirit on the Divine helped us to overcome our fears, allowing us to draw our strength from deeper wisdom flowing through us with each new breath.

Awaken to divine guidance we are liberated from fear and empowered to celebrate our unique and gifted life and to serve God in our relationship with others. Further, it expanded empathy for others and willingness to safely and appropriately support them in this time of pandemic.

Loving God, we bring our fear, uncertainty, panic, and anxiety to you. We place our whole self, fear and courage alike, in your hands. Use our fears and anxiety as instruments of grace and empathy. Transform our fear to action that we might serve you in this challenging time, giving glory to you and beauty to the world. Amen.

The COVID-19 pandemic is considered as the most crucial global health calamity of the century and the greatest challenge that the humankind faced since the 2nd World War. In December 2019, a new infectious respiratory disease emerged in Wuhan, Hubei Province, China and was named by the World Health Organization as COVID-19 (coronavirus disease 2019). As far as the history of human civilization is concerned there are instances of severe outbreaks of diseases caused by a number of viruses. Globally, as on 7 June 2020, there have been 70 lakhs confirmed cases of COVID-19, including 4 lakh deaths, reported to WHO from more than 200 countries throughout the world. Till now there is no report of any clinically approved antiviral drugs or vaccines that are effective against COVID-19. What we have contributed may be a drop in the ocean but for the people who received our help, it made an ocean of difference. I would like to let you know the impact of our help and support over the lives of the people in their own words:

Chennupalli Padmavathi: *“I am a physically challenged person from my birth. Added to my fate, I am a single parent finding hard to bring up my two children. During this time of uncertainty due to Covid-19 lockdown, I was in an utter despair with no means for living. JMJ Sisters came to my rescue; I am grateful to them for supporting me and my children during these hard times.”*



Sk. Khajaabi: *“I am 13 years old. Due to an accident during my childhood, I lost my right hand and now I am with a prosthetic hand. My mother is a widow having to feed ten children. At a time when we received no support from any government scheme or other, in our struggle for the survival during these lock down days, JMJ Sisters are supporting us with rice and dry provisions which brought a great relief for my mother and the whole family.*”

Venkateswarlu, Leader of a Tribal Hamlet: *“We are pleased to acknowledge that JMJ Sisters have stood by us at this crucial time. We experience God’s providence reaching out to us through them, truly God is helping us; it is God who is sending these angles in human form to help us in our poverty.”*

Pallapu Madhavi: *“I am the bread winner of my family. I work cleaning red chilly stalks in a ‘Mirchi Yard’. I am a single woman left with two children. One child has loco-motor disability. Due to the alarming situation of COVID-19 and its lockdown, we lost our only source of livelihood. In our vulnerability, JMJ Sisters stood by us and not only sustained us physically but emotionally too. We extend our whole hearted thanks to them.”*



JMJ Sisters in India continue responding to the emerging crisis, affecting those living at the peripheries of society. These are tough times for everyone, but more for poor migrant workers, daily wage earners, children and families on streets, in slums, and those who are already living in poverty. We strive to continue with our minuscule efforts to reach out to the peripheries by lending a shoulder to lean on, to fill a hungry stomach, to cover a family with a mantle of love, to wipe away every tear and ultimately to illuminate lives.

Pope Francis words strengthen our faith. “Don’t forget: Crucifix and Gospel. Let us open our whole heart to Jesus in prayer, letting His gaze rest on us, and we will understand that we are not alone, but loved because the Lord doesn’t abandon us and doesn’t forget us ever”

We remember our holy Founder’s exhortation: Sisters, turn to God who is your Father. Reflect on the journey you have covered so far. Feel inwardly impelled to proceed with renewed zeal. A zeal that impresses everyone!

Long Live JMJ! With renewed strength of our faith, we gaze at our ever loving Father! We live these sacred days with grace and hope for better future for everyone!

We continue to pray for those affected by coronavirus that they may be healed with the precious blood of Jesus Christ. We also pray for scientists so that they may make vaccine for COVID-19 with the help of the Divine.



Keeping faith in Pandamic

Our lives have been affected in so many ways by this coronavirus pandemic. Following public policy due to this dreaded illness has turned our lives upside down. Praying and Caring: Prayer is source of God's blessings and healing. The simplest way to enter into the gifts of prayer is to pray for the needs of the world and the people around. I felt strongly that prayer is a powerful weapon to fight against COVID-19. I chose to pray personally every day and as a community before the Blessed Sacrament to the Holy Trinity to heal the world and protect the lives of the people around. Life is a precious gift to be celebrated, appreciated and lived happily. As the death toll was mounting up in USA, we pleaded desperately before God to protect the people from corona virus as Abraham pleaded before Yahweh to protect the city of Sodom.

The second important thing is to care for people. Caring connects us with people, befriending the needy and suffering. We reached out to few people with food stuff who were in quarantine. Keeping in mind that compassion is not primarily about what we give or what we do. It's all about who we are in Jesus in our mission. I made several calls to elderly people in Zuni and the parishners enquiring how they are and assuring God's protection and prayers.

Sharing and Daring: Sharing the love of Christ and risking one's life for the common good is the heart of a missionary. On line teaching and assisting my students to learn in a new teaching process was stressful, I needed extra effort and time. I saw it as a challenge and ventured myself to teach students through on line distance mode. I experienced sense of satisfaction and happiness by reassuring God's love, protection and care to my students through teaching. Christ is the solution to all our problems; He strengthened and energized me to be proactive during the difficult times.

Every opportunity to serve someone will boost one's happiness and wellbeing- this was true to me I often drew happiness by being with people and serving them. I volunteered on every Monday to send the study packets to students at the pick-up and drop-off session. Though I know I can be exposed to corona virus, yet I saw that was an opportunity to serve the people and to assure them God's protection.

As a people of faith, lets emerge from this pandemic more empathetic than ever to the reality of loneliness and social isolation. What we now feel must serve as the spark needed to light the flame of desire to do more for those among us who suffer due to isolation in so many ways from the world around them. St. Paul says – *'in all things we are victorious... nothing separates us from the love of God in Christ Jesus. (Rom. 38-39).*

The Charism of our Founder an “ever adaptable apostolic availability” endowed on the members of our Congregation obliges each one of us to adapt to the changing times and needs of the people and be always available at the service of the poor and needy. It’s a clarion call to follow Christ and encounter His presence among the poor, through JMJ identity - it’s my conviction of life. We can only be at the service of the poor 24X7 only if we are connected to God 24X7. If not, our zeal diminishes, our strength vanishes, and our fervor fades away sooner than we ever realize.



JMJ SSS, Palamanner is dedicated to serve the poor through the Self-Help Groups (SHGs) and empowerment of women in particular and families at large. A Self-Help Group is a village based financial intermediary committee usually composed of 10-20 local women. The members make small regular saving contributions for a few months until there is enough capital in the group for lending to those in need of financial aid.

Works of mercy - through JMJ SHGs:

To feed the hungry: “Give a man a fish, and you feed him for a day. Teach a man to fish, and you feed him for a lifetime is well known Chinese proverb.” This is what we do in and through our SHGs. It’s about socio-economic empowerment of women, usually mothers to take up small business through micro-credit programme, which increases their economic condition, progressively helping them towards economic self-reliance.

To give water to the thirsty: Water is the basic necessity of life. During summer we have a special project especially in our rural hamlets where people walk for long distance to fetch drinking water. We identify these villages and make water tents with pots filled with portable drinking water with the help of SHG leaders. This arrangement provides drinking water to people every day quenching their thirst during summer season.

To clothe the naked: We provide new garments for the elderly, destitute and orphan children twice in a year. We also identify people in public places in need of dresses and provide fresh attires for them.

To visit the sick: Our SHG members to visit the sick in their locality and we ourselves accompany them, if needed take them or refer them to hospitals



for further care. The local SHG leaders take responsibility of feeding the elderly sick in their vicinity.

We have empowered thousands of women both socially and economically. It's so satisfying to listen to the stories of their self-reliance, witness to the dignity of their labour and self-respect they earn from the public. Besides the women are trained in skill development like tailoring, bag and sanitary napkin making, which enabled women's self-employment, self-reliance, and gender equality.



Our Founder aimed at education and empowerment of women as a means to liberate the oppressed Dutch Catholic Church of his time. Today following the example of our founder, we are working towards the empowerment of women whose rights are denied, and whose cry is often unheard.

What so ever you do to the least: The lock down due to COVID 19 has crippled the lives of many especially the poor-daily laborers, migrants and domestic workers. In Palamaner of Chittoor district most of the families are agricultural workers. In response to the cry of the people for their basic need amidst the lock down, we reached out to the families in our neighborhood distributing the essential food items and masks. God's plans cannot be comprehended but we believe what we read in Jer: 29:11 "For I know the plans I have for you. Plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future."
